

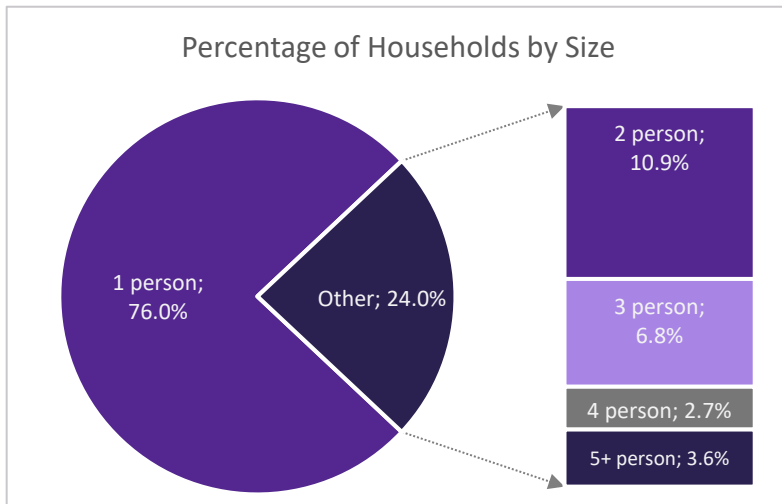


Quarterly Report NY-516 - Clinton County CoC

4/1/2017-6/30/2017

Overview – All Programs

Between 4/1/2017 and 6/30/2017, providers in the Clinton County CoC served 501 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessnessⁱ. Residential programs served 128 peopleⁱⁱ, and supportive services only (SSO) programs served 393 peopleⁱⁱⁱ.



There were 338 households in the CoC, including: 264 households without children (containing 274 individuals), 71 households with both adults and children (containing 96 adults and 128 children), and 3 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 3 minors^{iv}.

By gender, providers in the CoC served 217 (43.3%) women and 284 (56.7%) men.

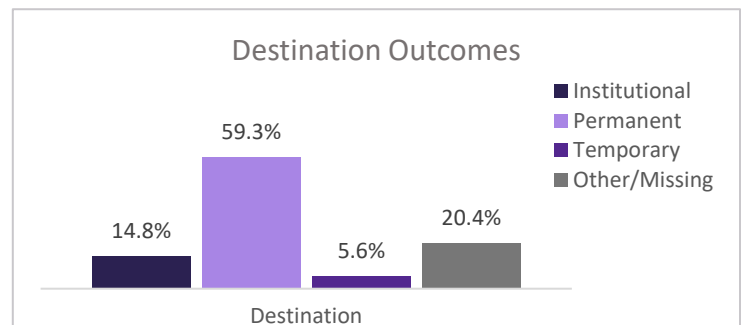
The racial and ethnic breakdown of those served included: 421 (84.0%) White, 48 (9.6%)

Black or African-American, 9 (1.8%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 19 (3.8%) Multiple Races. 14 (2.8%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race.



Of 371 adults or heads of household, 248 (66.8%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 145 (58.5%) reported no previous episodes of homelessness within the last three years. 56 (22.6%), 19 (7.7%), and 23 (9.3%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 7 (2.8%) did not report on this data element.

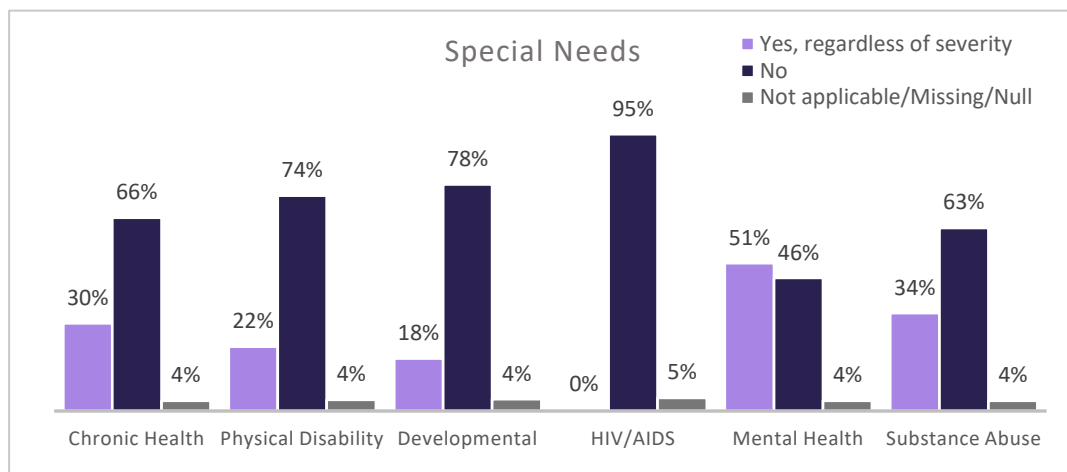
For the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (18), 11 (61.1%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and the most recent update, while 4 (22.2%) saw no change in income that was initially higher than zero^v.



The total number of individuals discharged during the quarter was 54, which included 43 adults and 11 children. 32 (59.3%) were discharged to a permanent

destination. Income for 3 (7.0%) clients over 18 rose between admission and discharge, while 39 (90.7%) maintained stable income of greater than zero.

Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only



83.8% of adults (299/357) and 35.1% of children (46/131) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting

multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (125). When taking severity of condition into account, 123 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.

Sub-Populations – All Programs

8 (2.2%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry.^{vi} 1 out of every 27.5 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (3.6%).
