


Quarterly Report

NY-520 - Franklin County CoC

4/1/2017-6/30/2017

<u>Overview – All Programs</u>

Between 4/1/2017 and 6/30/2017, providers in the Franklin County CoC served 163 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessnessⁱ. Residential programs served these 163 peopleⁱⁱ.




There were 102 households in the CoC, including: 68 households without children (containing 74 individuals), 33 households with both adults and children (containing 39 adults and 49 children), and 1 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 1 minorⁱⁱⁱ.

By gender, providers in the CoC served 91 (55.8%) women and 72 (44.2%) men.


The racial and ethnic breakdown of those served included: 142 (87.1%) White, 1 (0.6%)

Black or African-American, 1 (0.6%) Asian, 9 (5.5%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 6 (3.7%) Multiple Races. 9 (5.5%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race.



Of 113 adults or heads of household, 22 (19.5%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 14 (63.6%) reported no previous episodes of homelessness within the last three years. 4 (18.2%), 2 (9.1%), and 1 (4.5%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 1 (4.5%) did not report on this data element.


For the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (23), 5 (21.7%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and the most recent update, while 11 (47.8%) saw no change in income that was initially higher than zero^{iv}.



The total number of individuals discharged during

the quarter was 32, which included 29 adults and 3 children. 15 (46.9%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Income for 3 (10.3%) clients over 18 rose between admission and discharge, while 26 (89.7%) maintained stable income of greater than zero.

Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only



57.1% of adults (8/14) and 22.2% of children (2/9) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling. When taking severity of condition into account,

5 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.

<u>Sub-Populations – All Programs</u>

1 (7.1%) individual over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. v 1 out of every 2.8 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (35.7%). Out of the 5 veterans served, 2 (40.0%) reported a disabling condition.
