


Quarterly Report

NY-516 - Clinton County CoC

1/1/2017-3/31/2017

<u>Overview – All Programs</u>

Between 1/1/2017 and 3/31/2017, providers in the Clinton County CoC served 528 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessnessⁱ. Residential programs served 120 people, and 417 people were served by supportive services only programsⁱⁱ.




There were 371 households in the CoC, including: 306 households without children (containing 322 individuals), 63 households with both adults and children (containing 89 adults and 115 children), and 2 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 2 minorsⁱⁱⁱ.

By gender, providers in the CoC served 215 (40.7%) women and 313 (59.3%) men.

The racial and ethnic breakdown of those served included: 454 (86.0%) White, 44 (8.3%)


Black or African-American, 3 (0.6%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 24 (4.5%) Multiple Races. 19 (3.6%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race.



Of 411 adults or heads of household, 271 (65.9%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 140 (34.1%) reported no previous episodes of homelessness within the last three years. 68 (16.5%), 29 (7.1%), and 30 (7.3%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 6 (1.5%) did not report on this data element.


For the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (14), 7 (50.0%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and the most recent update, while 4 (28.6%) saw no change in income that was initially higher than zero^{iv}.

The total number of individuals discharged during the quarter was 217, which included 177 adults



and 40 children. 91 (41.9%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Income for 6 (3.4%) clients over 18 rose between admission and discharge, while 170 (96.0%) maintained stable income of greater than zero.

<u>Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only</u>



85.8% of adults (345/402) and 36.8% of children (43/117) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition regardless of whether condition had the become serious enough to be disabling. Among reporting

multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (146). When taking severity of condition into account, 69 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.

Sub-Populations – All Programs

5 (1.2%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. 16 veterans were served, comprising 1 out of every 25 adults receiving services this quarter (4.0%).
