


# **Quarterly Report**

# NY-523 - Glen Falls/Saratoga Springs/Saratoga County CoC

1/1/2017-3/31/2017

#### Overview - All Programs


Between 1/1/2017 and 3/31/2017, providers in the Glen Falls/Saratoga Springs/Saratoga County CoC served 382 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness<sup>i</sup>. Residential programs served 355 people, and 27 people were served by supportive services only programs<sup>ii</sup>.



There were 328 households in the CoC, including: 264 households without children (containing 274 individuals), 28 households with both adults and children (containing 34 adults and 38 children), and 36 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 36 minors<sup>iii</sup>.


By gender, providers in the CoC served 151 (39.5%) women, 229 (59.9%) men and 2 (0.5%) trans-identified individuals.

The racial and ethnic breakdown of those served included: 317 (83.0%) White, 41 (10.7%) Black or African-American, 1 (0.3%) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 5 (1.3%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 11 (2.9%) Multiple Races. 31 (8.1%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race.




Out of 339 adults or heads of household, 125 (36.9%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 58 (17.1%) reported no previous episodes of homelessness within the last three years. 31 (9.1%), 19 (5.6%), and 23 (6.8%) reported that they had been homeless 2, 3, or 4+ times (respectively) during the same time frame. 6 (1.8%) did not report on this data element.

For the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (29), 18 (62.1%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and the most recent update, while 8 (27.6%) saw no change in income that was initially higher than zero<sup>iv</sup>.



The total number of individuals discharged during the quarter was 138, which included 107 adults and 31 children. 73 (52.9%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Income for 17 (15.9%) clients over 18 rose between admission and discharge, while 82 (76.6%) maintained stable income of greater than zero.

### Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only



79.3% of adults (138/174) and 42.9% of children (30/70) in HUD HHS funded or programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition regardless of whether condition become serious enough to be disabling. Among those reporting

multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (38). When taking severity of condition into account, 100 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.

#### **Sub-Populations** – *All Programs*

18 (10.3%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. ¹ 1 out of every 2.7 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (37.4%). Out of the 65 veterans served, 30 (46.2%) reported a disabling condition and 4 (6.2%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission.
