


Quarterly Report

NY-608 - Kingston/Ulster County CoC

4/1/2017-6/30/2017

<u>Overview – All Programs</u>


Between 4/1/2017 and 6/30/2017, providers in the Kingston/Ulster County CoC served 708 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessnessⁱ. Residential programs served these 708 peopleⁱⁱ.



There were 438 households in the CoC, including: 271 households without children (containing 272 individuals), 133 households with both adults and children (containing 167 adults and 233 children), and 34 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 36 minorsⁱⁱⁱ.

By gender, providers in the CoC served 372 (52.5%) women, 335 (47.3%) men, and 1 (0.1%) trans-identified individuals.

The racial and ethnic breakdown of those served included: 462 (65.3%) White, 191 (27.0%) Black or African-American, 1 (0.1%) Asian, 2 (0.3%) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 5 (0.7%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 45 (6.4%) Multiple Races. 125 (17.7%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race.



Of 472 adults or heads of household, 89 (18.9%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 41 (46.1%) reported no previous episodes of homelessness within the last three years. 23 (25.8%), 9 (10.1%), and 16 (18.0%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 1 (1.1%) did not report on this data element.

For the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (48), 18 (37.5%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and the most recent update, while 20 (41.7%) saw no change in income that was initially higher than zero^{iv}.




The total number of individuals discharged during

the quarter was 271, which included 159 adults and 112 children. 167 (61.6%) were discharged to a

permanent destination. Income for 26 (16.4%) clients over 18 rose between admission and discharge, while 129 (81.1%) maintained stable income of greater than zero.

<u>Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only</u>



69.5% of adults (305/439) and 12.3% of children (33/269) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition regardless of whether condition had become serious enough to be disabling. Among those reporting

multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (116). When taking severity of condition into account, 253 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.

Sub-Populations – All Programs

18 (4.1%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. ¹ 1 out of every 33.8 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (3.0%). Out of the 13 veterans served, 9 (69.2%) reported a disabling condition and 1 (7.7%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission.
