


Quarterly Report

NY-507 - Schenectady City & County CoC

7/1/2017-9/30/2017

Overview – All Programs

Between 7/1/2017 and 9/30/2017, providers in the Schenectady City & County CoC served 2509 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessnessⁱ. Residential programs served 1399 peopleⁱⁱ, and supportive services only (SSO) programs served 1221 people iii.




There were 1971 households in the CoC, including: 1709 households without children (containing 1736 individuals), 226 households with both adults and children (containing 285 adults and 446 children), and 36 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 45 minorsiv.

By gender, providers in the CoC served 1201 (47.9%) women, 1270 (50.6%) men, and 5 (0.2%) trans-identified individuals.


The racial and ethnic breakdown of those

served included: 1058 (42.2%) White, 1181 (47.1%) Black or African-American, 27 (1.1%) Asian, 22 (0.9%) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 31 (1.2%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 154 (6.1%) Multiple Races. 387 (15.4%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race.



Of 2035 adults or heads of household, 808 (39.7%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 466 (57.7%) reported no previous episodes of 144 homelessness within the last three years. (17.8%), 63 (7.8%), and 152 (18.8%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 43 (5.3%) did not report on this data element.

For the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (231), 136 (58.9%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and the most recent update, while 69 (29.9%) saw no change in income that was initially higher than zerov.




The total number of individuals discharged during

the quarter was 631, which included 444 adults and 187 children. 337 (53.4%) were discharged to a

permanent destination. Of the clients over 18, income for 16 (3.6%) clients rose between admission and discharge, while 243 (54.7%) maintained stable income of greater than zero.

<u>Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only</u>



62.4% of adults (767/1230) and 10.7% of children (28/261) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition regardless of whether condition had become serious enough to be disabling. Among those reporting

multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (153). When taking severity of condition into account, 407 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.

Sub-Populations – All Programs

79 (3.9%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. 1 out of every 17.7 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (5.6%). Out of the 114 veterans served, 53 (46.5%) reported a disabling condition and 6 (5.3%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission.
