

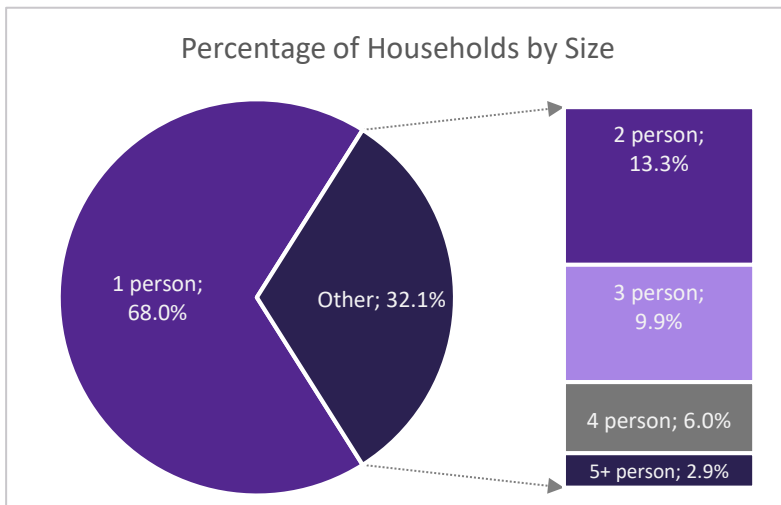

Overview – All Programs

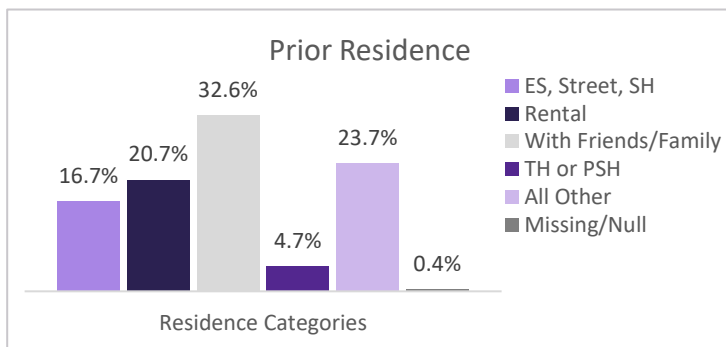
Between 7/1/2017 and 9/30/2017, providers in the Kingston/Ulster County CoC served 803 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessnessⁱ. Residential programs served 792 peopleⁱⁱ, and supportive services only (SSO) programs served 18 peopleⁱⁱⁱ.



There were 487 households in the CoC, including: 304 households without children (containing 309 individuals), 149 households with both adults and children (containing 192 adults and 265 children), and 34 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 37 minors^{iv}.

By gender, providers in the CoC served 438 (54.5%) women, 364 (45.3%) men, and 1 (0.1%) trans-identified individuals.

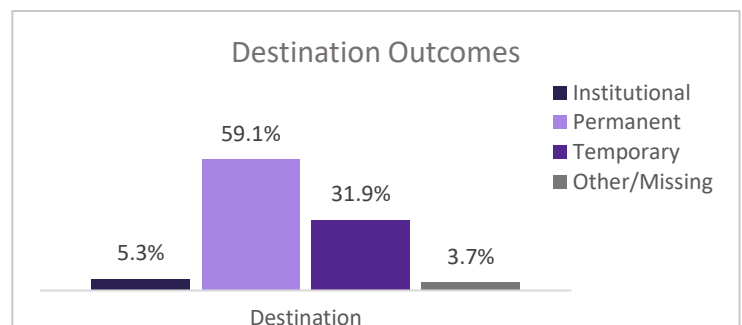
The racial and ethnic breakdown of those served included: 506 (63.0%) White, 209 (26.0%) Black or African-American, 1 (0.1%) Asian, 2 (0.2%) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 4 (0.5%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 70 (8.7%) Multiple Races. 113 (14.1%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race.



Of 527 adults or heads of household, 88 (16.7%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 45 (51.1%) reported no previous episodes of homelessness within the last three years. 17 (19.3%), 10 (11.4%), and 17 (19.3%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. () did not report on this data element.

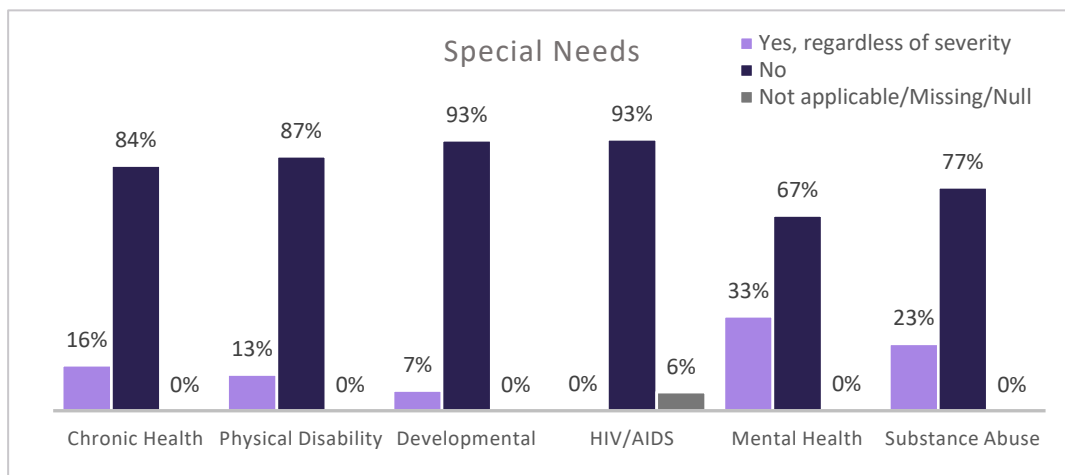
For the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (59), 24 (40.7%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and the most recent update, while 22 (37.3%) saw no change in income that was initially higher than zero^v.

The total number of individuals discharged during the quarter was 323, which included 203 adults and



120 children. 191 (59.1%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Of the clients over 18, income for 26 (12.8%) rose between admission and discharge, while 172 (84.7%) maintained stable income of greater than zero.

Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only



67.9% of adults (340/501) and 10.6% of children (32/302) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting

multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (117). When taking severity of condition into account, 273 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.

Sub-Populations – All Programs

25 (5.0%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry.^{vi} 1 out of every 45.5 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (2.2%). Out of the 11 veterans served, 7 (63.6%) reported a disabling condition and 1 (9.1%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission.
