Subject: Housing Inventory and Point in Time Count Summary

This memorandum summarizes highlights from the 2018 Housing Inventory Chart (HIC) and Point in Time Count (PIT). The HIC-PIT will be submitted on the CoC's behalf on April 30th, 2018 in accordance to HUD's requirement.

2018 Housing Inventory Summary

Continuums are required to report annually on the number of available beds dedicated to homeless persons; these beds include emergency, transitional and permanent housing. Below is a summary of changes within these beds from 2017 to 2018.

- **Year- Round Emergency Beds:** *The year-round bed count increased from 56 to 79. This increase was largely due to the addition of Salvation Army beds*
- **Emergency Seasonal Beds:** *The seasonal bed count remained 0*
- **Overflow Beds:** *The overflow bed count increased from 70 to 101*
 - *Catholic Charities of Chemung/Schuylers increased by 2*
 - *Schuylers Co. DSS voucher beds reported 13 overflow beds (not on last year's HIC)*
 - *Steuben County DSS increased by 26*
- **Transitional:** *The year-round bed count decreased from 75 to 68*
 - *Accord HUD SHP not on this year's HIC*
 - *Arbor Housing and Development DV transitional housing increased from 11 to 17*
 - *Chances and Changes increased by 2*
- **Permanent Housing Beds:** *The PSH bed count slightly increased from 237 to 268*
 - *Arbor Housing and Development-Livingston HUD SH 232 increased by 5 beds*
 - *Arbor Housing and Development- S+C Steuben County increased by 43*
 - *Catholic Charities of Chemung/Schuylers Homeless Supportive Housing HUD Permanent increased by 5 beds*
 - *Catholic Charities of Chemung/Schuylers SHP Permanent Housing increased by 4 beds*
- **Rapid Rehousing:** *The Rapid Rehousing bed count decreased from 228 to 194*
- **Chronic Beds:** *The number of dedicated chronic beds increased from 41 to 45*

Sheltered PIT Breakdown

- When Comparing the 2018 sheltered PIT (219) with the 2017 PIT (199) an increase in the total number of persons is noted
- In total, there was an increase of 30 persons utilizing services on the night of the count with a 43 person increase utilizing emergency services and a decrease of 13 utilizing Transitional Housing

Sheltered Subpopulations

- Chronically Homeless Individuals: The number of Chronically homeless sheltered individuals decreased from 1 person in 2017 to 0 persons in 2018.
- Chronically Homeless families remained the same at 0 families.
- Chronically homeless Vets: The number of Chronically homeless vets remained the same between 2107 and 2018 at 0 persons.
- Adults with a serious mental illness: The number of sheltered persons with serious mental illness increased from 13 persons in 2017 to 72 in 2018.
- Adults with a substance use disorder: The number of sheltered persons with substance use disorder increased from 4 in 2017 to 52 in 2018.
- Adults with HIV/AIDS remained the same between 2017 and 2018 at 0 persons.
- Victims of Domestic Violence increased from 17 in 2017 to 19 in 2018.

Unsheltered PIT breakdown

- When comparing the 2018 unsheltered PIT with the 2017 PIT a decrease was noted
- In 2018 there were 14 unsheltered persons compared to 37 identified in the 2017 count.
- The number of unsheltered families decreased from 2 in 2017 to 0 unsheltered families in 2018.

Unsheltered subpopulations

- Chronically Homeless individuals: The number of chronically homeless unsheltered individuals decreased from 5 in 2017 to 0 in 2018. remained the same at 0 between 2017 and 2018.
- Chronically homeless families: the number of chronically homeless families remained the same between 2017 and 2018 at 0 families.
- Chronically homeless Vets: The number of chronically homeless vets decreased from 1 in 2017 to 0 in 2018.
- Adults with a serious mental illness: The number of adults with a serious mental illness decreased from 17 in 2017 to 6 in 2018

- Adults with a substance use disorder: The number of adults with a substance abuse disorder decreased from 11 persons in 2017 to 4 in 2018
- Adults with HIV/AIDS: Adults with HIV/AIDS decreased from 1 person in 2017 to 0 persons in 2018.
- Victims of Domestic Violence: The number of unsheltered adults noting DV decreased from 6 in 2017 to 2 in 2018.
