

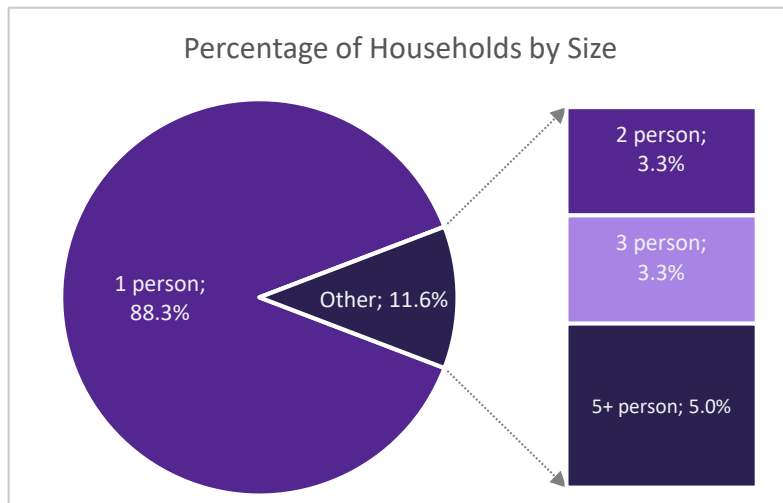
Quarterly Report

Fulton, Montgomery, and Schoharie Counties

10/1/2017-12/31/2017

Overview – All Programs

Between 10/1/2017 and 12/31/2017, providers in the Fulton, Montgomery, and Schoharie Counties community served 79 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessnessⁱ. Residential programs served 31 peopleⁱⁱ, and supportive services only (SSO) programs served 48 peopleⁱⁱⁱ.

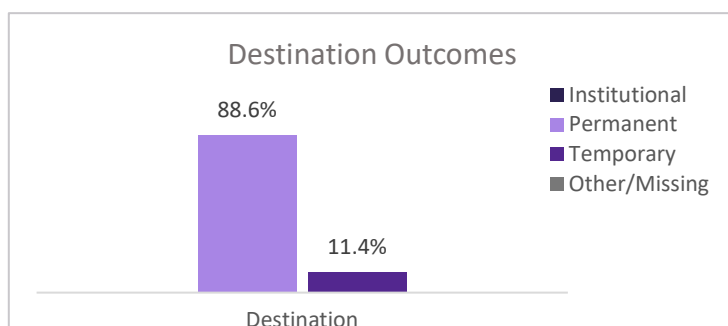
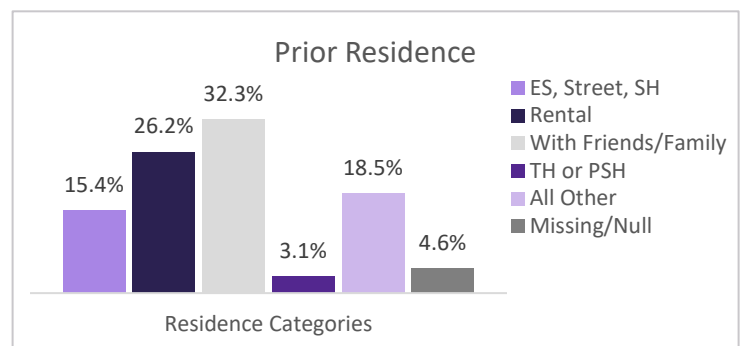


There were 60 households in the community, including: 51 households without children (containing 54 individuals), 5 households with both adults and children (containing 7 adults and 14 children), and 4 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 4 minors^{iv}.

By gender, providers in the community served 28 (35.4%) women, 48 (60.8%) men, and 3 (3.8%) trans-identified individuals.

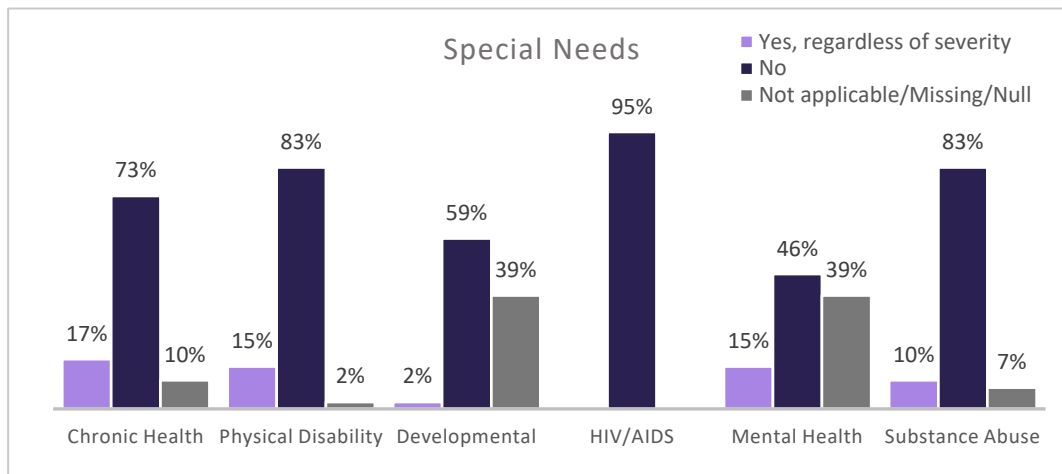
The racial and ethnic breakdown of those served included: 57 (72.2%) White, 14 (17.7%) Black or African-American, and 1 (1.3%) Multiple Races. 19 (24.1%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race.

Of 65 adults or heads of household, 10 (15.4%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 8 (80.0%) reported no previous episodes of homelessness within the last three years. 3 (30.0%) reported that they had been 2 times homeless during the same time frame.



The total number of individuals discharged during the quarter was 35, which included 22 adults and 13 children. 31 (88.6%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Income for 3 (13.6%) clients over 18 rose between admission and discharge, while 18 (81.8%) maintained stable income of greater than zero.

Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only



34.3% of adults (12/35) and no children (0/6) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting multiple conditions,

the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (3). When taking severity of condition into account, 5 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.

Sub-Populations – All Programs

No individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry.^v 1 out of every 7.6 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (13.1%). Out of the 8 veterans served, 5 (62.5%) reported a disabling condition, and none met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission. 22 clients (36.1%) were considered youth, aged 18- 24 years.
