

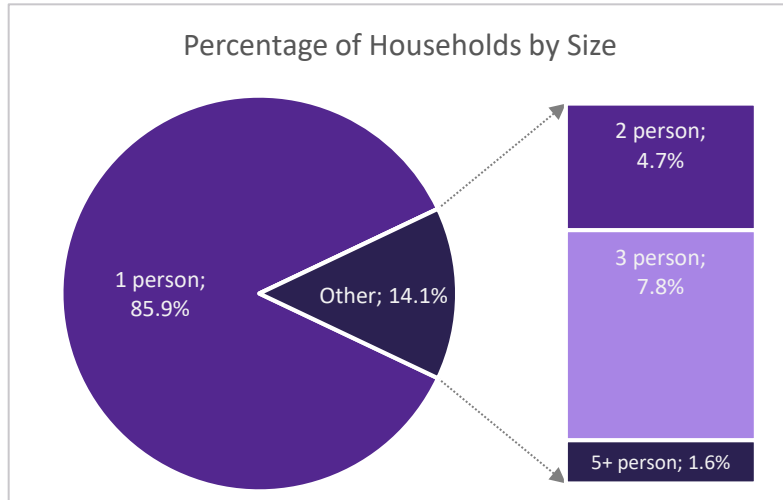

Fulton, Montgomery, and Schoharie Counties

1/1/2018-3/31/2018

Overview – All Programs

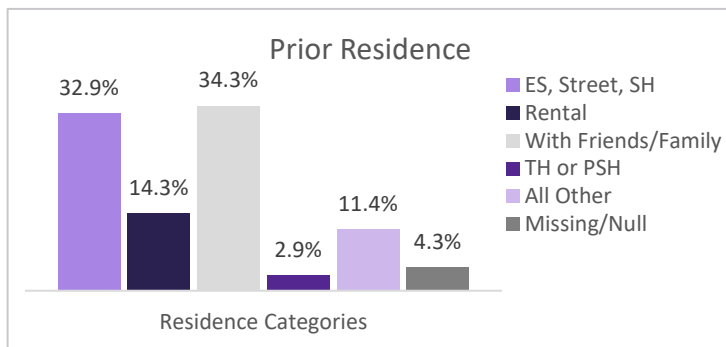
Between 1/1/2018 and 3/31/2018, providers in the Fulton, Montgomery, and Schoharie Counties served 81 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessnessⁱ. Residential programs served 47 peopleⁱⁱ, and supportive services only (SSO) programs served 34 peopleⁱⁱⁱ.



There were 64 households in the community, including: 53 households without children (containing 56 individuals), 7 households with both adults and children (containing 10 adults and 11 children), and 4 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 4 minors^{iv}.

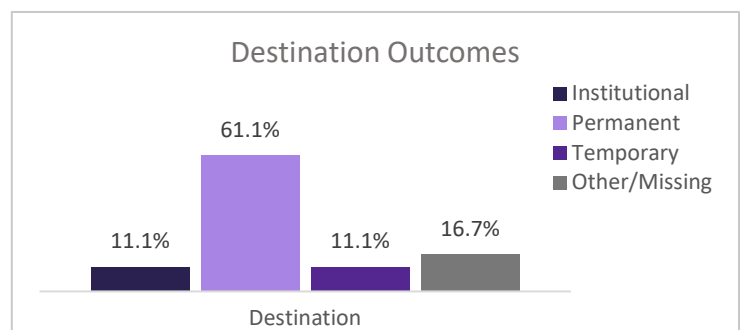
By gender, providers in the community served 29 (35.8%) women, 49 (60.5%) men, and 3 (3.7%) trans-identified individuals.

The racial and ethnic breakdown of those served included: 55 (67.9%) White, 10 (12.3%) Black or African-American, and none identified as Asian, Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, American Indian or Alaskan Native, or Multiple Races. 23 (28.4%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race.



Of 70 adults or heads of household, 23 (32.9%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 11 (47.8%) reported no previous episodes of homelessness within the last three years. 8 (34.8%), 1 (4.3%), and 3 (13.0%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame.

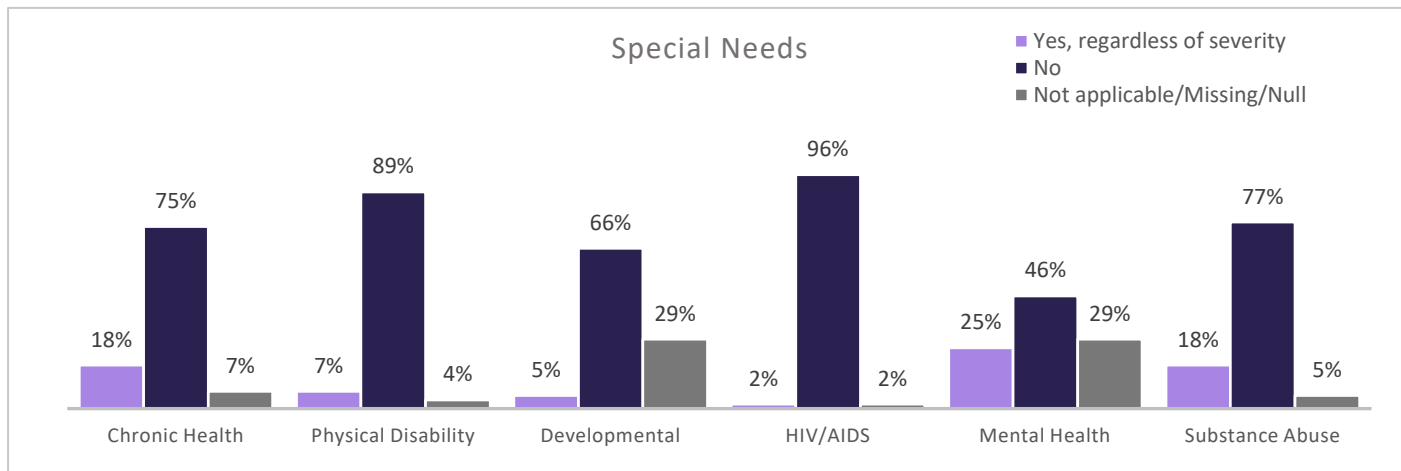
The total number of individuals discharged during the quarter was 36, which included 34 adults and 2 children. 22 (61.1%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Income for no clients over 18 rose between admission and discharge, while 10 (29.4%) maintained stable income of greater than zero.



Sub-Populations – All Programs

1 (1.5%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry.^v 1 out of every 13.2 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (7.6%). Of all clients, 24 (36.4%) were considered youth (aged 18- 24 years).

Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only



44.4% of adults (20/45) and no children (0/11) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (6). When taking severity of condition into account, 9 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.
