


# **Quarterly Report**

# NY-519 - Columbia/Greene County CoC

10/1/2017-12/31/2017

### <u>Overview – All Programs</u>

Between 10/1/2017 and 12/31/2017, providers in the Columbia/Greene County CoC served 139 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness<sup>i</sup>. Residential programs served 52 people<sup>ii</sup>, and supportive services only (SSO) programs served 88 people<sup>iii</sup>.




There were 69 households in the CoC, including: 43 households without children (containing 46 individuals), 25 households with both adults and children (containing 35 adults and 57 children), and 1 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 1 minors<sup>iv</sup>.


By gender, providers in the CoC served 83 (59.7%) women and 56 (40.3%) men.

The racial and ethnic breakdown of those served included: 99 (71.2%) White, 18 (12.9%)

Black or African-American, and 18 (12.9%) Multiple Races. 19 (13.7%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race.

Of 82 adults or heads of household, 28 (34.1%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 11 (39.3%) reported no previous episodes of homelessness within the last three years. 2 (7.1%), 4 (14.3%), and 10 (35.7%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 1 (3.6%) did not report on this data element.






For the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (26), 14 (53.8%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and the most recent update, while 4 (15.4%) saw no change in income that was initially higher than zero<sup>v</sup>.

The total number of individuals discharged during the quarter was 79, which included 37 adults and 42 children. 69 (87.3%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Income for 1 (2.7%) clients over 18 rose between admission and discharge, while 35 (94.6%) maintained stable income of greater than zero.

### Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only



69.1% of adults (38/55) and 15.4% of children (6/39) in HUD or HHS funded programs selfreported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition regardless of whether condition the had become serious enough to be disabling. Among those reporting multiple conditions, the

most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (14). When taking severity of condition into account, 27 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.

### **Sub-Populations – All Programs**

14 (17.3%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. ¹ 1 out of every 40.5 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (2.5%). None met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission.
