



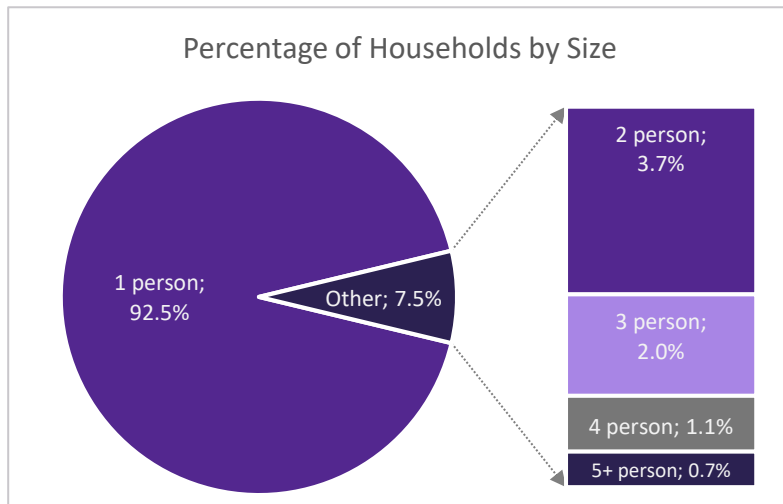
# Quarterly Report

## NY-503 - Albany City & County CoC

1/1/2017-3/31/2017

### Overview – All Programs

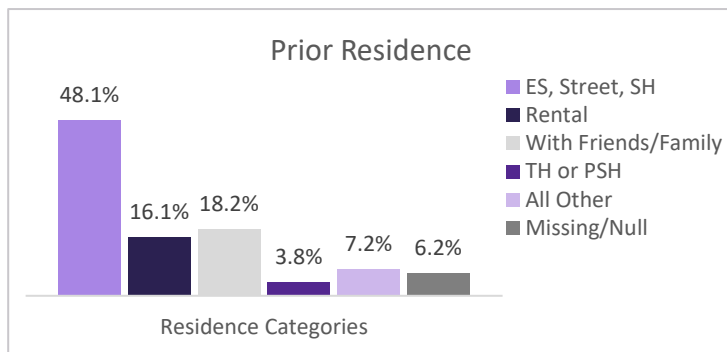
Between 1/1/2017 and 3/31/2017, providers in the Albany City & County CoC served 4581 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness<sup>i</sup>. Residential programs served 1758 people, and 3147 people were served in supportive services only programs<sup>ii</sup>.



There were 4008 households in the CoC, including: 3579 households without children (containing 3616 individuals), 259 households with both adults and children (containing 322 adults and 455 children), and 170 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 188 minors<sup>iii</sup>.

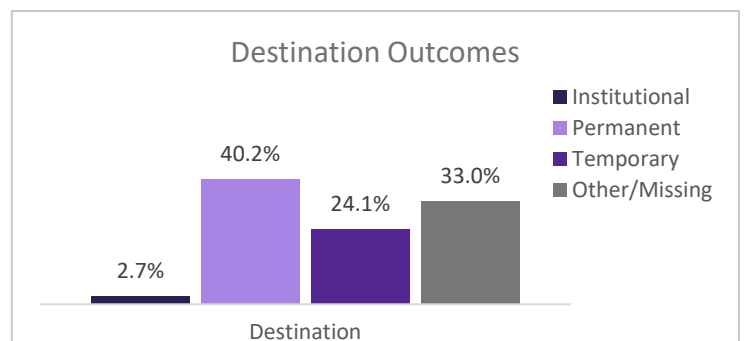
By gender, providers in the CoC served 1881 (41.1%) women, 2610 (57.0%) men and 74 (1.6%) trans-identified individuals.

The racial and ethnic breakdown of those served included: 1661 (36.3%) White, 2320 (50.6%) Black or African-American, 26 (0.6%) Asian, 18 (0.4%) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 78 (1.7%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 191 (4.2%) Multiple Races. 578 (12.6%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race.



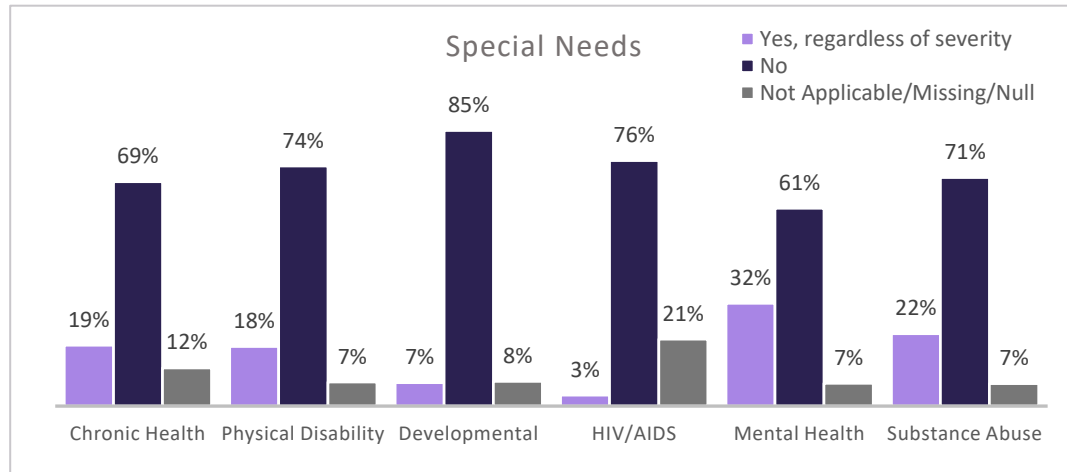
Of 4084 adults or heads of household, 1964 (48.1%) indicated a prior residence of, Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 981 (24.0%) reported no previous episodes of homelessness within the last three years. 341 (8.3%), 185 (4.5%), and 382 (9.4%) reported that they had been homeless 2, 3, or 4+ times (respectively) during the same time frame. 138 (3.4%) did not report on this data element.

For the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (178), 99 (55.6%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and the most recent update, while 63 (35.4%) saw no change in income that was initially higher than zero<sup>iv</sup>.



The total number of individuals discharged during the quarter was 773, which included 616 adults and 157 children. 311 (40.2%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Income for 45 (7.3%) clients over 18 rose between admission and discharge, while 306 (49.7%) maintained stable income of greater than zero.

### **Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only**



59.3% of adults (2173/3667) and 20.0% of children (113/564) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting

multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (572). When taking severity of condition into account, 1463 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.

### **Sub-Populations – All Programs**

248 (6.8%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry.<sup>v</sup> 1 out of every 10.3 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (9.7%). Out of the 356 veterans served, 221 (62.1%) reported a disabling condition and 25 (7.0%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission.
