

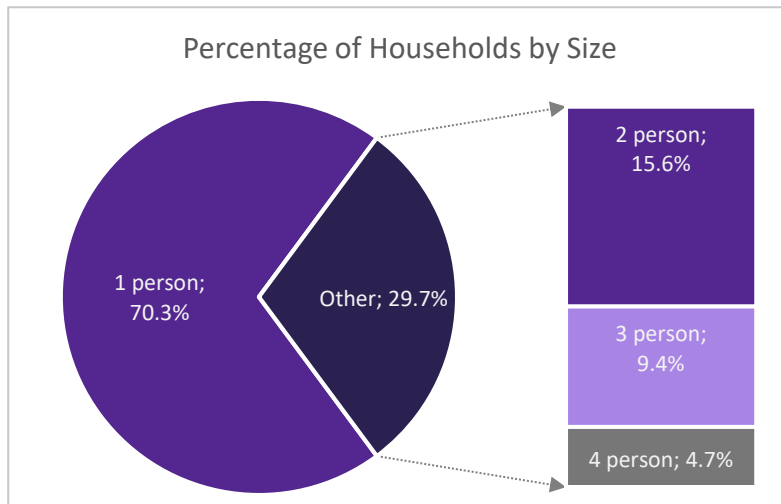
Quarterly Report

NY-519 - Columbia/Greene County CoC

1/1/2017-3/31/2017

Overview – All Programs

Between 1/1/2017 and 3/31/2017, providers in the Columbia/Greene County CoC served 95 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessnessⁱ. Residential programs served 80 individuals, and 15 individuals were served by supportive services only programsⁱⁱ.

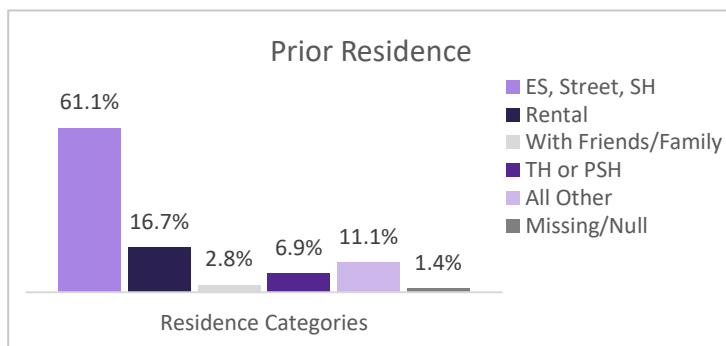


There were 64 households in the CoC, including: 50 households without children (containing 55 individuals), 14 households with both adults and children (containing 17 adults and 23 children). There were no households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age)ⁱⁱⁱ.

By gender, providers in the CoC served 47 (49.5%) women and 48 (50.5%) men.

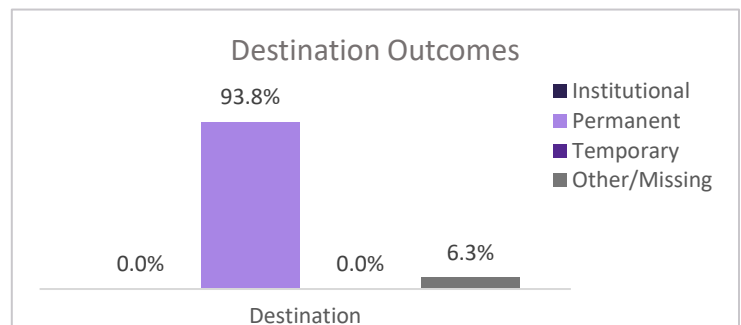
The racial and ethnic breakdown of those served included: 74 (77.9%) White, 15 (15.8%)

Black or African-American, and 5 (5.3%) Multiple Races. 8 (8.4%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race.



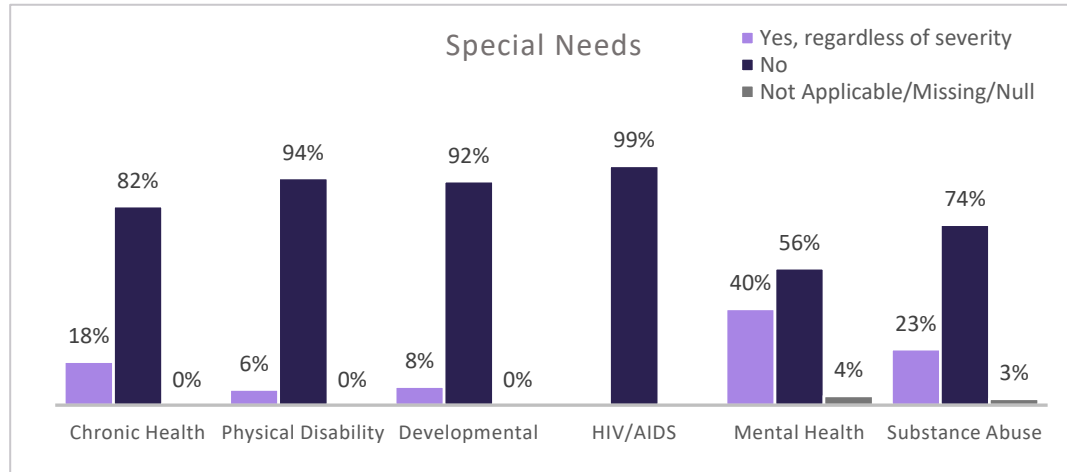
Of 72 adults or heads of household, 44 (61.1%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 21 (29.2%) reported no previous episodes of homelessness within the last three years. 8 (11.1%), 5 (6.9%), and 9 (12.5%) reported that they had been homeless 2, 3, or 4+ times (respectively) during this time frame. 1 (1.4%) did not report on this data element.

For the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (16), 9 (56.3%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and the most recent update, while 2 (12.5%) saw no change in income that was initially higher than zero^{iv}.



The total number of individuals discharged during the quarter was 16, which included 14 adults and 2 children. 15 (93.8%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Income for 1 (7.1%) client over 18 rose between admission and discharge, while 13 (92.9%) maintained stable income of greater than zero.

Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only



70.0% of adults (42/60) and 5.6% of children (1/18) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting multiple conditions,

the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (15). When taking severity of condition into account, 30 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.

Sub-Populations – All Programs

13 (21.7%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry.^v 1 out of every 60.0 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (1.7%).
