



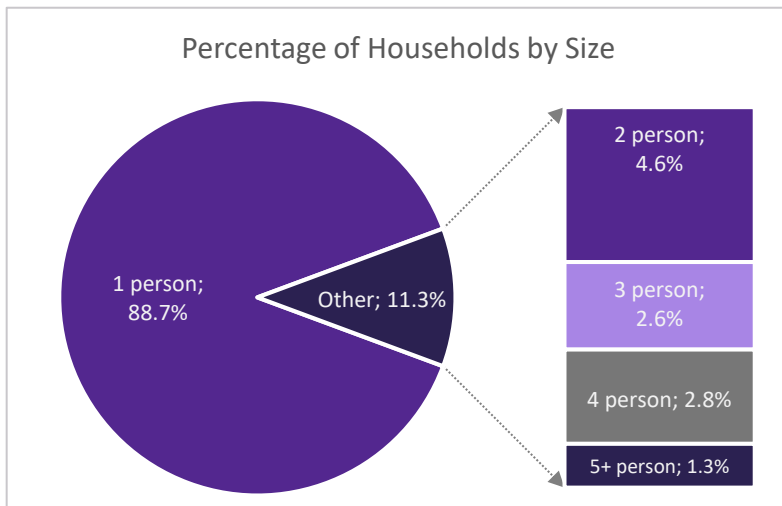
## Quarterly Report

# NY-507 - Schenectady City & County CoC

4/1/2017-6/30/2017

### Overview – All Programs

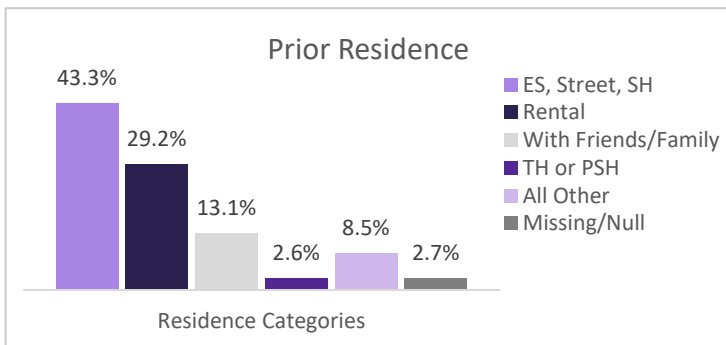
Between 4/1/2017 and 6/30/2017, providers in the Schenectady City & County CoC served 2245 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness<sup>i</sup>. Residential programs served 1254 people<sup>ii</sup>, and supportive services only (SSO) programs served 1070 people<sup>iii</sup>.



There were 1811 households in the CoC, including: 1598 households without children (containing 1617 individuals), 184 households with both adults and children (containing 232 adults and 360 children), and 29 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 36 minors<sup>iv</sup>.

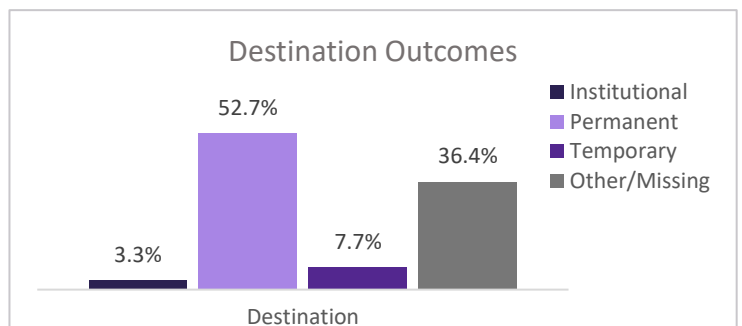
By gender, providers in the CoC served 1000 (44.5%) women, 1239 (55.2%) men, and 3 (0.1%) trans-identified individuals.

The racial and ethnic breakdown of those served included: 1012 (45.1%) White, 1036 (46.1%) Black or African-American, 25 (1.1%) Asian, 15 (0.7%) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 27 (1.2%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 116 (5.2%) Multiple Races. 324 (14.4%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race.



Of 1870 adults or heads of household, 810 (43.3%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 392 (48.4%) reported no previous episodes of homelessness within the last three years. 135 (16.7%), 61 (7.5%), and 143 (17.7%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 144 (17.8%) did not report on this data element.

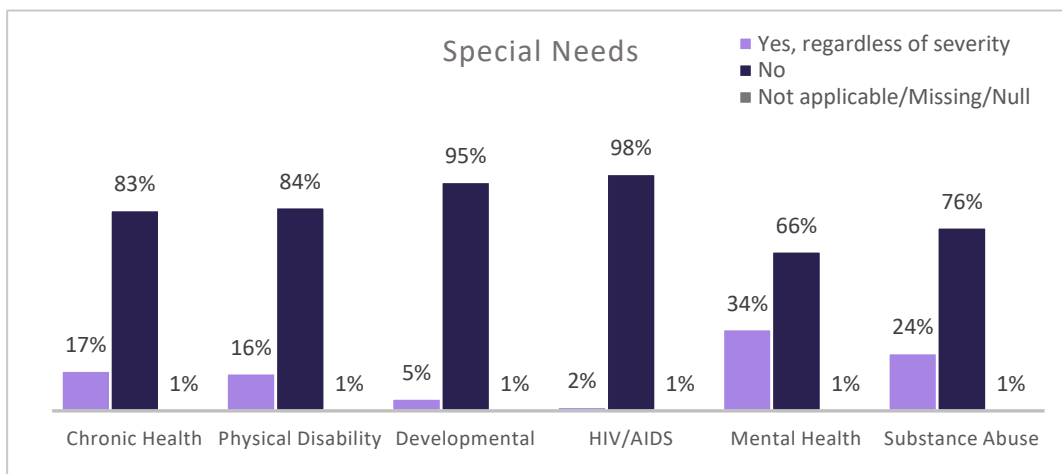
For the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (178), 120 (67.4%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and the most recent update, while 40 (22.5%) saw no change in income that was initially higher than zero<sup>v</sup>.



The total number of individuals discharged during the quarter was 522, which included 370 adults and 152 children. 275 (52.7%) were discharged to a

permanent destination. Income for 10 (2.7%) clients over 18 rose between admission and discharge, while 176 (47.6%) maintained stable income of greater than zero.

### **Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only**



67.1% of adults (417/621) and 10.5% of children (22/209) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting

multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (130). When taking severity of condition into account, 289 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.

### **Sub-Populations – All Programs**

83 (13.4%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry.<sup>vi</sup> 1 out of every 5.5 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (18.2%). Out of the 113 veterans served, 50 (44.2%) reported a disabling condition and 9 (8.0%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission.
