

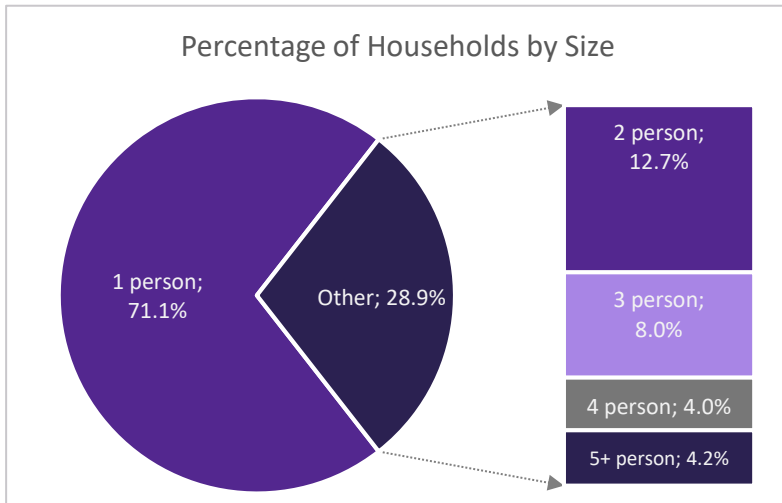

Overview – All Programs

Between 7/1/2017 and 9/30/2017, providers in the Clinton County CoC served 687 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessnessⁱ. Residential programs served 116 peopleⁱⁱ, and supportive services only (SSO) programs served 596 peopleⁱⁱⁱ.

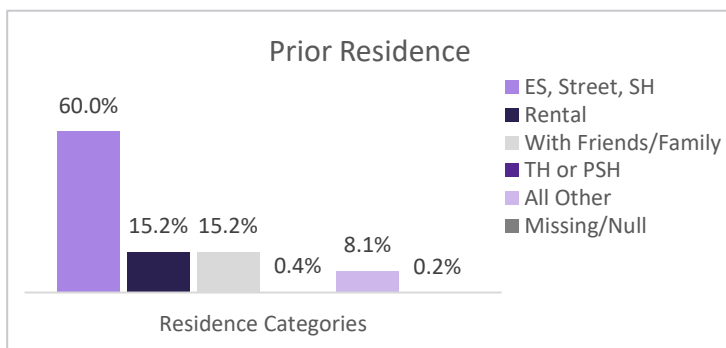


There were 426 households in the CoC, including: 313 households without children (containing 332 individuals), 104 households with both adults and children (containing 144 adults and 202 children), and 9 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 9 minors^{iv}.

By gender, providers in the CoC served 328 (47.7%) women and 359 (52.3%) men.

The racial and ethnic breakdown of those served included: 586 (85.3%) White, 47 (6.8%)

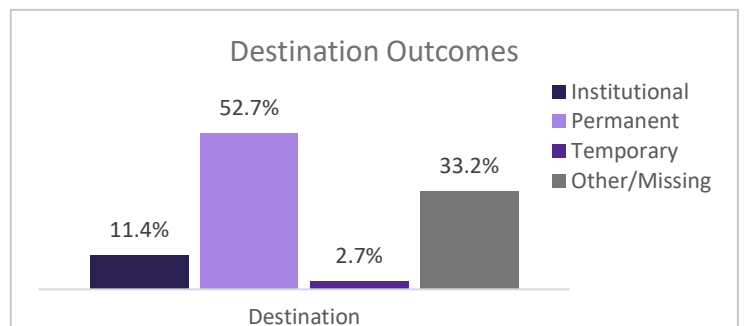
Black or African-American, 9 (1.3%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 38 (5.5%) Multiple Races. 23 (3.3%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race.



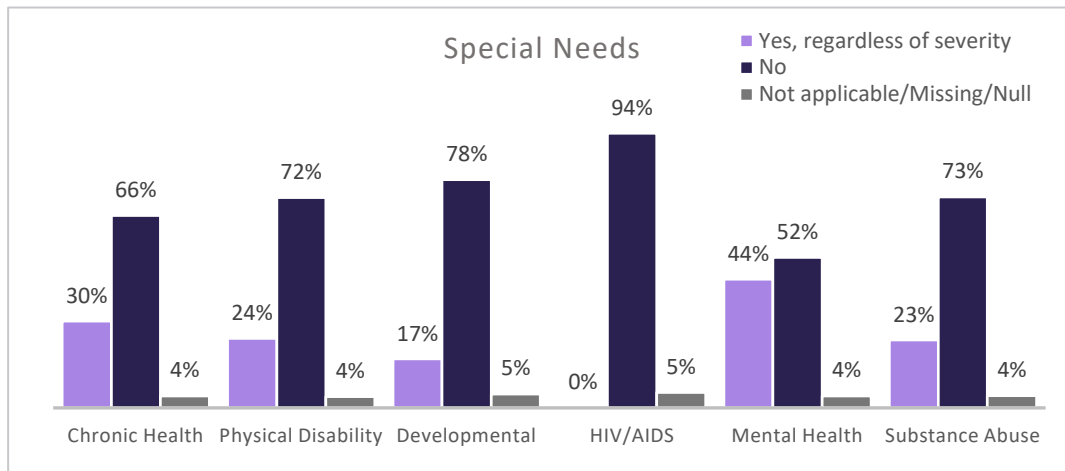
Of 480 adults or heads of household, 288 (60.0%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 186 (64.6%) reported no previous episodes of homelessness within the last three years. 57 (19.8%), 18 (6.3%), and 19 (6.6%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 10 (3.5%) did not report on this data element.

For the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (16), 12 (75.0%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and the most recent update^v.

The total number of individuals discharged during the quarter was 220, which included 163 adults and 57 children. 116 (52.7%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Of the clients over 18, income for 9 (5.5%) rose between admission and discharge, while 151 (92.6%) maintained stable income of greater than zero.



Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only



78.9% of adults (355/450) and 36.5% of children (77/211) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting

multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (113). When taking severity of condition into account, 196 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.

Sub-Populations – All Programs

8 (1.7%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. 1 out of every 25.1 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (4.0%). Out of the 19 veterans served, 2 (10.5%) reported a disabling condition and none met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission.
