


Quarterly Report

NY-520 - Franklin County CoC

<u>Overview – All Programs</u>

Between 10/1/2017 and 12/31/2017, providers in the Franklin County CoC served 127 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessnessⁱ. Residential programs served 127 peopleⁱⁱ, and supportive services only (SSO) programs served 0 peopleⁱⁱⁱ.




There were 104 households in the CoC, including: 95 households without children (containing 100 individuals), 9 households with both adults and children (containing 13 adults and 14 children), and households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing minors^{iv}.


By gender, providers in the CoC served 51 (40.2%) women, 75 (59.1%) men, and 1 (0.8%) trans-identified individuals.

The racial and ethnic breakdown of those

served included: 112 (88.2%) White, 1 (0.8%) Black or African-American, 1 (0.8%) Asian, 6 (4.7%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 6 (4.7%) Multiple Races. 2 (1.6%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race.

Of 113 adults or heads of household, 39 (34.5%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 23 (59.0%) reported no previous episodes of homelessness within the last three years. 7 (17.9%), 4 (10.3%), and 3 (7.7%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 2 (5.1%) did not report on this data element.






For the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (12), 3 (25.0%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and the most recent update, while 3 (25.0%) saw no change in income that was initially higher than zero^v.

The total number of individuals discharged during the quarter was 59, which included 58 adults and 1 children. 27 (45.8%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Income for no clients over 18 rose between admission and discharge, however 57 (98.3%) maintained stable income of greater than zero.

Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only



57.9% of adults (11/19) and 20.0% of children (2/10) in HUD or HHS funded programs selfreported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling. When taking severity condition into account,

5 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.

<u>Sub-Populations – All Programs</u>

No individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. ¹¹ 1 out of every 11.3 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (8.8%). Out of the 10 veterans served, 6 (60.0%) reported a disabling condition and none met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission.
