


### **Quarterly Report**

# NY-520 - Franklin County CoC

1/1/2018-3/31/2018

#### Overview - All Programs

Between 1/1/2018 and 3/31/2018, providers in the Franklin County CoC served 114 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness<sup>i</sup>. Residential programs served 114 people<sup>ii</sup>, and supportive services only (SSO) programs served no people<sup>iii</sup>.




There were 88 households in the CoC, including: 73 households without children (containing 74 individuals), 14 households with both adults and children (containing 18 adults and 21 children), and 1 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 1 minors<sup>iv</sup>.

By gender, providers in the CoC served 44 (38.6%) women, 69 (60.5%) men, and 1 (0.9%) trans-identified individuals.


The racial and ethnic breakdown of those

served included: 97 (85.1%) White, 2 (1.8%) Black or African-American, 1 (0.9%) Asian, 7 (6.1%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 6 (5.3%) Multiple Races. 1 (0.9%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race.



Of 92 adults or heads of household, 28 (30.4%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 17 (60.7%) reported no previous episodes of homelessness within the last three years. 5 (17.9%), 2 (7.1%), and 1 (3.6%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 3 (10.7%) did not report on this data element.

For the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (12), 2 (16.7%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and the most recent update, while 3 (25.0%) saw no change in income that was initially higher than zero<sup>v</sup>.




The total number of individuals discharged during the quarter was 48, which included 44 adults and 4 children. 24 (50.0%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Income for 1 (2.3%) clients over 18 rose between admission and discharge, while 9 (20.5%) maintained stable income of greater than zero.

#### <u>Sub-Populations – All Programs</u>

No individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry.  $^{vi}$  1 out of every 13.1 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (7.6%). Of all clients, 13 (14.1%) were considered youth (aged 18- 24 years).

### <u>Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only</u>



57.9% of adults (11/19) and 15.4% of children (2/13) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. When taking severity of condition into account, 5 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.
