


# **Quarterly Report**

# NY-523 - Glen Falls/Saratoga Springs/Saratoga County CoC

10/1/2017-12/31/2017

## <u>Overview – All Programs</u>

Between 10/1/2017 and 12/31/2017, providers in the Glen Falls/Saratoga Springs/Saratoga County CoC served 675 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness<sup>i</sup>. Residential programs served 446 people<sup>ii</sup>, and supportive services only (SSO) programs served 233 people<sup>iii</sup>.




There were 484 households in the CoC, including: 362 households without children (containing 384 individuals), 74 households with both adults and children (containing 100 adults and 144 children), and 48 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 49 minors<sup>iv</sup>.


By gender, providers in the CoC served 289 (42.8%) women, 375 (55.6%) men, and 8 (1.2%) trans-identified individuals.

The racial and ethnic breakdown of those

served included: 527 (78.1%) White, 89 (13.2%) Black or African-American, 6 (0.9%) Asian, 1 (0.1%) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 3 (0.4%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 32 (4.7%) Multiple Races. 47 (7.0%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race.

Of 528 adults or heads of household, 179 (33.9%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 79 (44.1%) reported no previous episodes of homelessness within the last three years. 48 (26.8%), 20 (11.2%), and 31 (17.3%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 8 (4.5%) did not report on this data element.






For the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (56), 30 (53.6%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and the most recent update, while 20 (35.7%) saw no change in income that was initially higher than zero<sup>v</sup>.

The total number of individuals discharged during the quarter was 212, which included 150 adults and 62 children. 124 (58.5%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Income for 12 (8.0%) clients over 18 rose between admission and discharge, while 134 (89.3%) maintained stable income of greater than zero.

## Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only



65.6% of adults (143/218) and 29.1% of children (39/134) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition regardless of whether condition become serious enough to be disabling. Among those reporting

multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (40). When taking severity of condition into account, 79 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.

### **Sub-Populations** – *All Programs*

16 (3.3%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. <sup>vi</sup> 1 out of every 4.1 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (24.5%). Out of the 118 veterans served, 52 (44.1%) reported a disabling condition and 3 (2.5%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission. 93 clients (19.3%) were considered youth, aged 18- 24 years.
