


Quarterly Report

NY-606 - Rockland County CoC

1/1/2018-3/31/2018

<u>Overview – All Programs</u>

Between 1/1/2018 and 3/31/2018, providers in the Rockland County CoC served 1099 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessnessⁱ. Residential programs served 324 peopleⁱⁱ, and supportive services only (SSO) programs served 778 peopleⁱⁱⁱ.




There were 570 households in the CoC, including: 401 households without children (containing 507 individuals), 159 households with both adults and children (containing 281 adults and 297 children), and 10 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 14 minors^{iv}.

By gender, providers in the CoC served 539 (49.0%) women, 519 (47.2%) men, and no trans-identified individuals.


The racial and ethnic breakdown of those

served included: 339 (30.8%) White, 442 (40.2%) Black or African-American, 4 (0.4%) Asian, 1 (0.1%) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 3 (0.3%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 11 (1.0%) Multiple Races. 167 (15.2%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race.



Of 790 adults or heads of household, 56 (7.1%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 30 (53.6%) reported no previous episodes of homelessness within the last three years. 5 (8.9%), 5 (8.9%), and 9 (16.1%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 7 (12.5%) did not report on this data element.

For the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (6), 3 (50.0%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and the most recent update, while 1 (16.7%) saw no change in income that was initially higher than zero^v.




The total number of individuals discharged during the quarter was 144, which included 140 adults and 4 children. 7 (4.9%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Income for 2 (1.4%) clients over 18 rose between admission and discharge, while 3 (2.1%) maintained stable income of greater than zero.

Sub-Populations – All Programs

4 (0.5%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. ^{vi} 1 out of every 29.2 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (3.4%). Out of the 27 veterans served, 10 (37.0%) reported a disabling condition and 2 (7.4%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission. Of all clients, 125 (15.9%) were considered youth (aged 18- 24 years).

Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only



4.7% of adults (26/558) and 2.1% of children (6/286) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling. Among those reporting multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (4). When taking severity of condition into account, 18 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.

Data quality and completeness play a major role in ensuring that these data accurately reflect the work being done within the CoC. CARES routinely tracks the health of HMIS data and this information may be found at www.caresny.org.
