



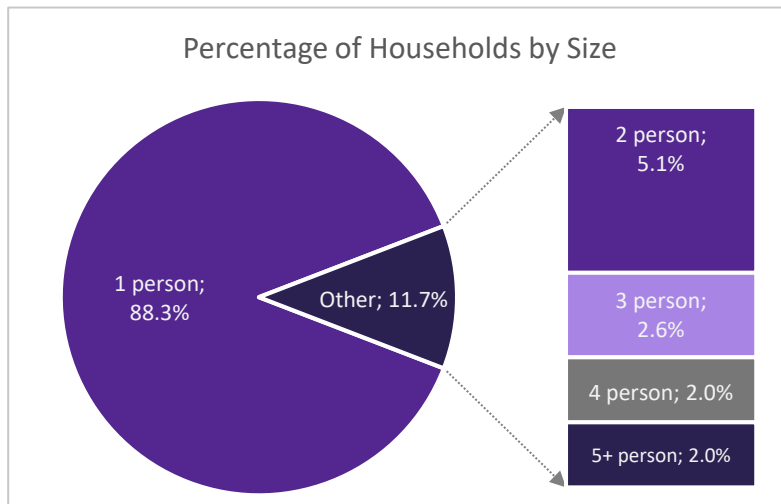
## Quarterly Report

# NY-507 - Schenectady City & County CoC

### Overview – All Programs

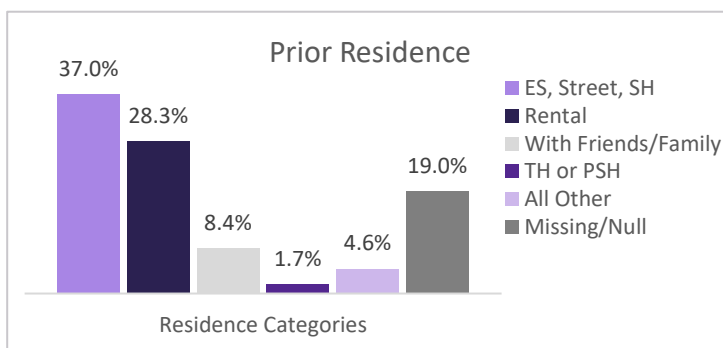
Between 4/1/2018 and 6/30/2018, providers in the Schenectady City & County CoC served 2773 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness<sup>i</sup>. Residential programs served 1423 people<sup>ii</sup>, and supportive services only (SSO) programs served 1567 people<sup>iii</sup>.



There were 2214 households in the CoC, including: 1902 households without children (containing 1932 individuals), 232 households with both adults and children (containing 299 adults and 463 children), and 80 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 81 minors<sup>iv</sup>.

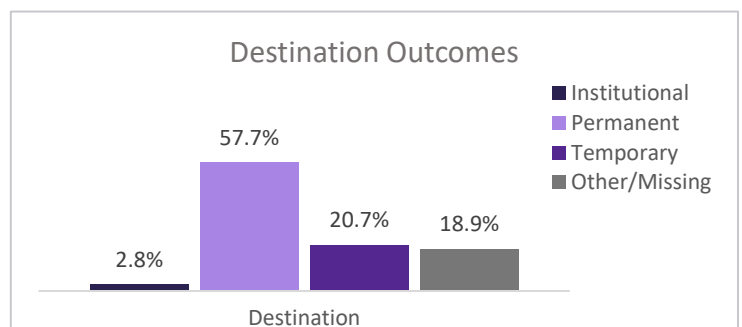
By gender, providers in the CoC served 1365 (49.2%) women, 1382 (49.8%) men, and 8 (0.3%) trans-identified individuals.

The racial and ethnic breakdown of those served included: 1105 (39.8%) White, 1325 (47.8%) Black or African-American, 31 (1.1%) Asian, 34 (1.2%) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 43 (1.6%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 193 (7.0%) Multiple Races. 444 (16.0%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race.



Of 2296 adults or heads of household, 850 (37.0%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 466 (54.8%) reported no previous episodes of homelessness within the last three years. 163 (19.2%), 70 (8.2%), and 205 (24.1%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 24 (2.8%) did not report on this data element.

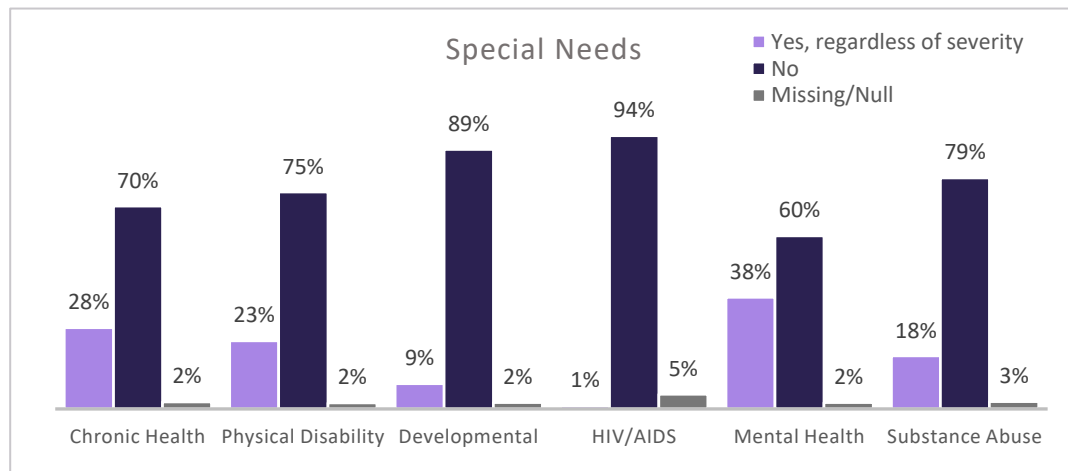
For the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (288), 153 (53.1%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and the most recent update, while 104 (36.1%) saw no change in income that was initially higher than zero<sup>v</sup>.



The total number of individuals discharged during the quarter was 541, which included 393 adults and 148 children. 312 (57.7%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Income for 32 (8.1%) clients over 18 rose between admission and discharge, while 233 (59.3%) maintained stable income of greater than zero.

### **Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only**

68.0% of adults (893/1313) and 21.4% of children (57/266) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling. Among those reporting multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (207).



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When taking severity of condition into account, 526 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.

### **Sub-Populations – All Programs**

133 (6.0%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry.<sup>vi</sup> 1 out of every 17.3 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (5.8%). Out of the 129 veterans served, 73 (56.6%) reported a disabling condition and 9 (7.0%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission. 334 (15.0%) clients were considered youth, aged 18-24 years.
