


# **Quarterly Report**

# NY-602 - Newburgh/Middletown/Orange County CoC

4/1/2018-6/30/2018

### Overview - All Programs

Between 4/1/2018 and 6/30/2018, providers in the Newburgh/Middletown/Orange County CoC served 2119 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness<sup>i</sup>. Residential programs served 1027 people<sup>ii</sup>, and supportive services only (SSO) programs served 1106 people<sup>iii</sup>.




There were 1721 households in the CoC, including: 1226 households without children (containing 1244 individuals), 174 households with both adults and children (containing 217 adults and 331 children), and 321 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 327 minors<sup>iv</sup>.

By gender, providers in the CoC served 972 (45.9%) women, 1049 (49.5%) men, and 4 (0.2%) trans-identified individuals.


The racial and ethnic breakdown of those served included: 856 (40.4%) White, 737

(34.8%) Black or African-American, 5 (0.2%) Asian, 11 (0.5%) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 15 (0.7%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 327 (15.4%) Multiple Races. 440 (20.8%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race.




Of 1770 adults or heads of household, 604 (34.1%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 215 (35.6%) reported no previous episodes of homelessness within the last three years. 87 (14.4%), 51 (8.4%), and 58 (9.6%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 195 (32.3%) did not report on this data element.

For the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (138), 70 (50.7%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and the most recent update, while 38 (27.5%) saw no change in income that was initially higher than zero<sup>v</sup>.



The total number of individuals discharged during the quarter was 413, which included 255 adults and 158 children. 204 (49.4%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Income for 13 (5.1%) clients over 18 rose between admission and discharge, while 195 (76.5%) maintained stable income of greater than zero.

## <u>Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only</u>



38.8% of adults (427/1101) and 6.5% of children (38/589) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition regardless of whether condition had become serious enough to be disabling. Among those reporting

multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (96). When taking severity of condition into account, 282 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.

### <u>Sub-Populations – All Programs</u>

44 (3.0%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. <sup>vi</sup> 1 out of every 20.3 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (4.9%). Out of the 72 veterans served, 34 (47.2%) reported a disabling condition and 7 (9.7%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission.
