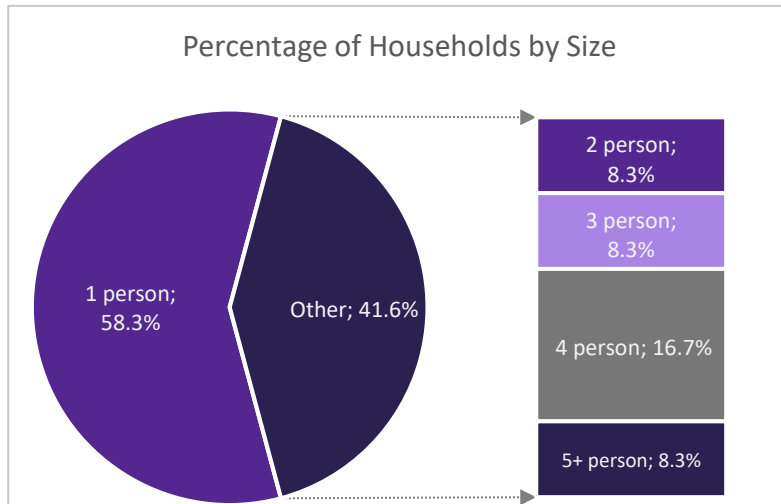




*Federal Fiscal Year 2018 Quarter 4 Report*  
**NY-506 - Fulton Montgomery Schoharie Counties CoC**

**Overview – All Programs**

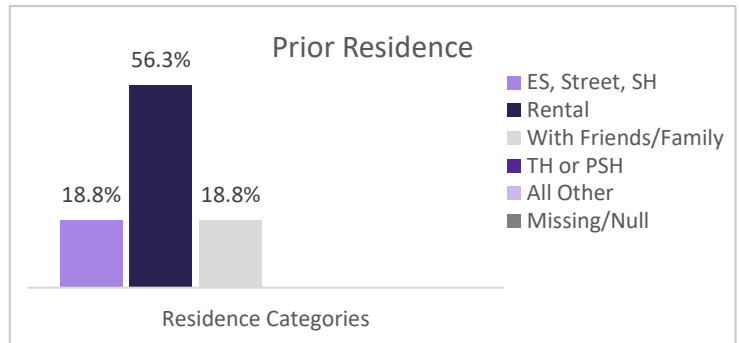
Between 7/1/2018 and 9/30/2018, providers in the FMS served 25 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness.<sup>i</sup> Residential programs served 6 people<sup>ii</sup>, and supportive services only (SSO) programs served 19 people.<sup>iii</sup>



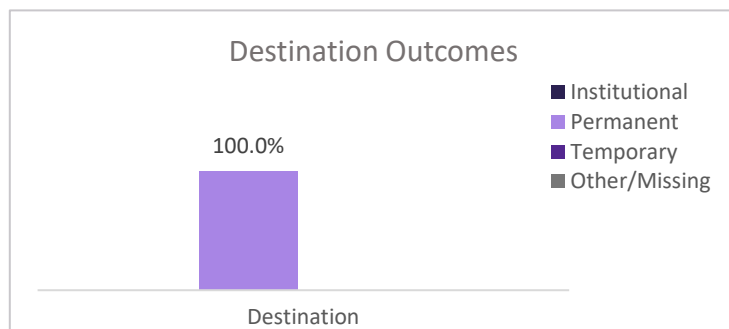
There were 12 households in the CoC, including: 7 households without children (containing 7 individuals), 5 households with both adults and children (containing 9 adults and 9 children), and no households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age).<sup>iv</sup>

By gender, providers in the CoC served 11 (44.0%) women, 14 (56.0%) men, and no trans-identified or gender non-conforming individuals.

The racial breakdown of those served included: 21 (84.0%) White and 3 (12.0%) American Indian or Alaskan Native.<sup>v</sup> Regardless of race, 6 (24.0%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino in ethnicity.<sup>vi</sup>

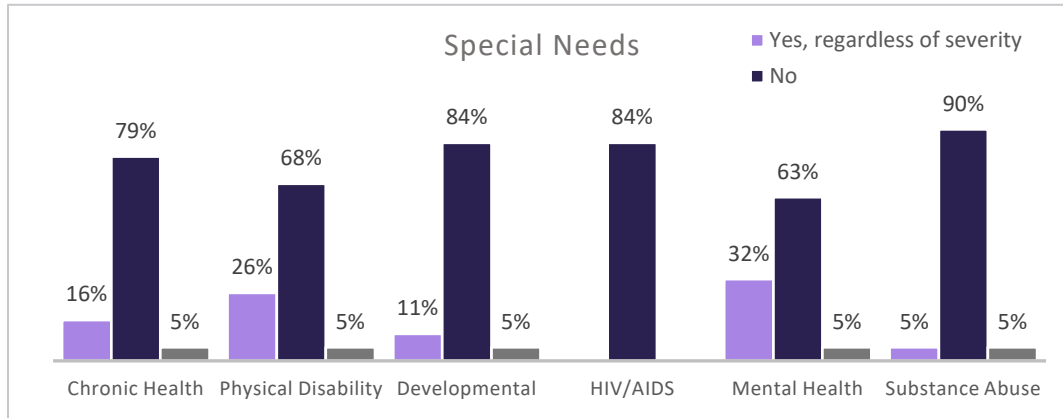


Of 16 adults or heads of household, 3 (18.8%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 2 (66.7%) reported one previous episode of homelessness within the last three years. 0, 0, and 4 (133.3%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame.



The total number of individuals discharged during the quarter was 19, which included 10 adults and 9 children. 19 (100.0%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Between admission and discharge, income for 1 (10.0%) clients over 18 rose, while 8 (80.0%) clients over 18 maintained a stable income of greater than zero.

## **Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only**



76.9% of adults (10/13) and 33.3% of children (2/6) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. When taking severity of condition into account, 4 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.<sup>vii</sup>

## **Sub-Populations – All Programs**

1 (7.1%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. 1 out of every 2.0 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (50.0%). Out of the 7 veterans served, 4 (57.1%) reported a disabling condition and 1 (14.3%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission. At admission, 3 clients (18.8%) of all clients were considered youth (18-24 years of age.)

Therefore, adding these two numbers may equal more than the total unduplicated number of persons served.

<sup>iv</sup> Data is based on **current** age and household composition, which may differ from information reported at admission.

<sup>v</sup> Clients may self-identify up to 5 race categories; for this report, all clients self-identifying with more than one race are grouped together into the "Multiple Races" category.
