


## Federal Fiscal Year 2018 Annual Report

# **NY-506 - Fulton Montgomery Schoharie Counties CoC**

10/1/2017-9/30/2018

## Overview - All Programs

Between 10/1/2017 and 9/30/2018, providers in the FMS served 104 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness.<sup>i</sup> Residential programs served 10 people<sup>ii</sup>, and supportive services only (SSO) programs served 94 people.<sup>iii</sup>





There were 59 households in the CoC, including: 41 households without children (containing 46 individuals), 15 households with both adults and children (containing 22 adults and 33 children), and 3 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 3 minors.<sup>iv</sup>

By gender, providers in the CoC served 51 (49.0%) women, 50 (48.1%) men, 3 (2.9%) trans-identified individuals, and no gender non-conforming individuals.

The racial breakdown of those served included: 94 (90.4%) White, 4 (3.8%) Black or African-American, 3 (2.9%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and none identifying as Multiple Races. Regardless of race, 25 (24.0%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino in ethnicity.


Of 71 adults or heads of household, 5 (7.0%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven.





The total number of individuals discharged during the year was 98, which included 62 adults and 36 children. 74 (75.5%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Between admission and discharge, income for 1 (1.6%) clients over 18 rose, while 24 (38.7%) clients over 18 maintained a stable income of greater than zero.

## Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only



50.9% of adults (29/57) and 25.0% of children (8/32) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (0). When taking severity of condition into account, 7 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.<sup>vii</sup>

## **Sub-Populations – All Programs**

2 (3.6%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. 1 out of every 3.7 adults receiving services this year was a veteran (27.3%). Out of the 15 veterans served, 9 (60.0%) reported a disabling condition and 2 (13.3%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission. At admission, 25 clients (36.8%) of all clients were considered youth (18-24 years of age.)

For these 'Persons Served' numbers only: if an individual client is served by **BOTH** Residential and Supportive Services programs within the same year, the client is counted once in Residential **AND** once in Supportive Services. Therefore, adding these two numbers may equal more than the total unduplicated number of persons served.

Vicients may self-identify up to 5 race categories in HMIS; for the purposes of this report, all clients self-identifying with more than one race are grouped together into the "Multiple Races" category.

vi HUD data standards collects Ethnicity information under the rationale: "To indicate clients who do and do not identify themselves as Hispanic or Latino." HMIS options for ethnicity are: Hispanic/Latino, Non-Hispanic/Latino, Client doesn't know, Client refused, or Data not collected.
