


Federal Fiscal Year 2018 Annual Report

NY-516 - Clinton County CoC

10/1/2017-9/30/2018

Overview - All Programs

Between 10/1/2017 and 9/30/2018, providers in the Clinton served 1347 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness.¹ Residential programs served 317 people¹¹, and supportive services only (SSO) programs served 1030 people.¹¹¹




There were 796 households in the CoC, including: 612 households without children (containing 677 individuals), 180 households with both adults and children (containing 270 adults and 339 children), and 4 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 6 minors.^{iv}

By gender, providers in the CoC served 605 (44.9%) women, 679 (50.4%) men, 4 (0.3%) trans-identified individuals, and 2 (0.1%) gender non-conforming individuals.


The racial breakdown of those served included: 1101 (81.7%) White, 78 (5.8%) Black or African-American, 13 (1.0%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 89 (6.6%) Multiple Races. Regardless of race, 73 (5.4%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino in ethnicity. Individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino in ethnicity.

Of 949 adults or heads of household, 610 (64.3%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 422 (69.2%) reported one previous episode of homelessness within the last three years. 92 (15.1%), 33 (5.4%), and 35 (5.7%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 32 (5.2%) did not report on this data element.




Of the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (30), 8 (26.7%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and their most recent update, while 9 (30.0%) maintained a stable income of greater than zero.

The total number of individuals discharged during the year was 773, which included 550 adults and 223 children. 486 (62.9%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Between admission and discharge, income for 9 (1.6%) clients over 18 rose, while 240 (43.6%) clients over 18 maintained a stable income of greater than zero.



Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only



82.1% of adults (750/913) and 36.1% of children (116/321) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (262). When taking severity of condition into account, 588 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.^{vii}

Sub-Populations - All Programs

42 (4.6%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. 1 out of every 13.6 adults receiving services this year was a veteran (7.3%). Out of the 67 veterans served, 41 (61.2%) reported a disabling condition and 3 (4.5%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission. At admission, 114 clients (12.0%) of all clients were considered youth (18-24 years of age.)

Therefore, adding these two numbers may equal more than the total unduplicated number of persons served.

^v Clients may self-identify up to 5 race categories in HMIS; for the purposes of this report, all clients self-identifying with more than one race are grouped together into the "Multiple Races" category.

vi HUD data standards collects Ethnicity information under the rationale: "To indicate clients who do and do not identify themselves as Hispanic or Latino." HMIS options for ethnicity are: Hispanic/Latino, Non-Hispanic/Latino, Client doesn't know, Client refused, or Data not collected.
