


Federal Fiscal Year 2018 Annual Report

NY-523 - Glen Falls/Saratoga Springs/Saratoga County CoC

10/1/2017-9/30/2018

<u>Overview – All Programs</u>

Between 10/1/2017 and 9/30/2018, providers in the Saratoga served 1283 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness.ⁱ Residential programs served 844 peopleⁱⁱ, and supportive services only (SSO) programs served 439 people.ⁱⁱⁱ




There were 934 households in the CoC, including: 713 households without children (containing 754 individuals), 125 households with both adults and children (containing 168 adults and 232 children), and 96 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 98 minors.^{iv}

By gender, providers in the CoC served 538 (41.9%) women, 696 (54.2%) men, 14 (1.1%) trans-identified individuals, and 1 (0.1%) gender non-conforming individuals.

The racial breakdown of those served included: 998 (77.8%) White, 151 (11.8%) Black or African-American, 8 (0.6%) Asian, 1 (0.1%) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 11 (0.9%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 64 (5.0%) Multiple Races. Regardless of race, 74 (5.8%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino in ethnicity.

Of 1010 adults or heads of household, 338 (33.5%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 140 (41.4%) reported one previous episode of homelessness within the last three years. 71 (21.0%), 41 (12.1%), and 70 (20.7%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 16 (4.7%) did not report on this data element.



Of the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (79), 31 (39.2%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and their most recent update, while 18 (22.8%) maintained a stable income of greater than zero.




The total number of individuals discharged during the year was 910, which included 667 adults and 243 children. 572 (62.9%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Between admission and discharge, income for 28 (4.2%) clients over 18 rose, while 264 (39.6%) clients over 18 maintained a stable income of greater than zero.

<u>Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only</u>

63.0% of adults (318/505) and 32.6% of children (92/282) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (79). When taking severity of condition into account, 172 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.^{vii}

<u>Sub-Populations – All Programs</u>



35 (4.3%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. 1 out of every 3.6 adults receiving services this year was a veteran (27.8%). Out of the 227 veterans served, 117 (51.5%) reported a disabling condition and 18 (7.9%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission. At admission, 202 clients (21.9%) of all clients were considered youth (18-24 years of age.)

For these 'Persons Served' numbers only: if an individual client is served by **BOTH** Residential and Supportive Services programs within the same year, the client is counted once in Residential **AND** once in Supportive Services. Therefore, adding these two numbers may equal more than the total unduplicated number of persons served.

iv Data based on current age and household composition, which may differ from information reported at admission.

Vicients may self-identify up to 5 race categories in HMIS; for the purposes of this report, all clients self-identifying with more than one race are grouped together into the "Multiple Races" category.

vi HUD data standards collects Ethnicity information under the rationale: "To indicate clients who do and do not identify themselves as Hispanic or Latino." HMIS options for ethnicity are: Hispanic/Latino, Non-Hispanic/Latino, Client doesn't know, Client refused, or Data not collected.
