


### Federal Fiscal Year 2019 Quarter 1 Report

# NY-606 - Rockland County CoC

10/1/2018 - 12/31/2018

#### Overview - All Programs

Between 10/1/2018 and 12/31/2018, providers in the Rockland CoC served 960 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness.<sup>i</sup> Residential programs served 189 people<sup>ii</sup>, and supportive services only (SSO) programs served 771 people.<sup>iii</sup>




There were 425 households in the CoC, including: 264 households without children (containing 381 individuals), 153 households with both adults and children (containing 278 adults and 284 children), and 8 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 13 minors. iv

By gender, providers in the CoC served 511 (53.2%) women, 416 (43.3%) men, and no trans-identified or gender non-conforming individuals.


The racial breakdown of those served included: 257 (26.8%) White, 405 (42.2%) Black or African-American, 3 (0.3%) Asian, 1 (0.1%) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 2 (0.2%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 6 (0.6%) Multiple Races. Regardless of race, 135 (14.1%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino in ethnicity. His particular experiences of the control of th

Of 659 adults or heads of household, 48 (7.3%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 17 (35.4%) reported one previous episode of homelessness within the last three years. 4 (8.3%), 4 (8.3%), and 17 (35.4%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 6 (12.5%) did not report on this data element.


Of the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (6), 2 (33.3%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and their most recent update, while 2 (33.3%) maintained a stable income of greater than zero.



The total number of individuals discharged during the quarter was 40, which included 20 adults and 20 children. 28 (70.0%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Between admission and discharge, income for 7 (35.0%) clients over 18 rose, while 1 (5.0%) clients over 18 maintained a stable income of greater than zero.



### <u>Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only</u>



8.1% of adults (48/591) and 1.8% of children (5/271) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (5). When taking severity of condition into account, 34 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.<sup>vii</sup>

#### Sub-Populations - All Programs

16 (2.8%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. 1 out of every 24.7 adults receiving services this quarter was a veteran (4.0%). Out of the 23 veterans served, 11 (47.8%) reported a disabling condition and 2 (8.7%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission. At admission, 119 clients (18.1%) of all clients were considered youth (18-24 years of age.)
