



# NY-523 - Glen Falls, Saratoga Springs/Saratoga, Washington, Warren, & Hamilton Counties CoC

### **Overview – All Programs**


Between 1/1/2019 and 3/31/2019, providers in the Saratoga-North Country CoC served 619 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness.<sup>i</sup> Residential programs served 424 people<sup>ii</sup>, and supportive services only (SSO) programs served 195 people.<sup>iii</sup>



There were 407 households in the CoC, including: 295 households without children (containing 312 individuals), 80 households with both adults and children (containing 109 adults and 153 children), and 32 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 34 minors. iv


By gender, providers in the CoC served 264 (42.6%) women, 339 (54.8%) men, 4 (0.6%) transidentified individuals, and 0 (0) gender non-conforming individuals.

The racial breakdown of those served included: 467 (75.4%) White, 87 (14.1%) Black or African-American, 1 (0.2%) Asian, 1 (0.2%) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 5 (0.8%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 42 (6.8%) Multiple Races. Of 450 adults or heads of household, 185 (41.1%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 85 (45.9%) reported one previous episode of homelessness within the last three years. 31 (16.8%), 21 (11.4%), and 40 (21.6%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 9 (4.9%) did not report on this data element.

Of the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (88), 31 (35.2%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and their most recent update, while 22 (25.0%) maintained a stable income of greater than zero.




The total number of individuals discharged during the year was 236, which included 152 adults and 84 children. 192 (81.4%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Between admission and discharge, income for 8 (5.3%) clients over 18 rose, while 71 (46.7%) clients over 18 maintained a stable income of greater than zero.

## <u>Sub-Populations – All Programs</u>

27 (6.7%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. <sup>vii</sup> 1 out of every 3.0 adults receiving services this year was a veteran (32.9%). Out of the 133 veterans served, 85 (63.9%) reported a disabling condition and 17 (12.8%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission. At admission, 62 clients (14.7%) of all clients were considered youth (18-24 years of age.)

## <u>Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only</u>



76.4% of adults (223/292) and 28.8% of children (46/160) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (64). When taking severity of condition into account, 161 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability. VIII

Vicients may self-identify up to 5 race categories in HMIS; for this report, all clients self-identifying with more than one race are grouped together into the "Multiple Races" category.

vi HUD collects Ethnicity information under the rationale: "To indicate clients who do and do not identify themselves as Hispanic or Latino."

vii Please note that HMIS began using HUD's new definition of chronic homelessness effective 10/1/2015 and all individuals in program on or after that date are measured using this new definition, even if their program start date was prior to the change in definition taking effect.
