


# CRHMIS Quarterly Report: 2019 Q3

# NY-519 - Columbia & Greene Counties CoC

#### Overview - All Programs

Between 4/1/2019 and 6/30/2019, providers in the Columbia-Greene CoC served 133 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness.<sup>i</sup> Residential programs served 98 individuals a total of 98 times, and supportive services-only programs served 35 individuals a total of 35 times.<sup>ii, iii</sup>




There were 70 households in the CoC, including: 52 households without children (containing 61 individuals), 18 households with both adults and children (containing 27 adults and 41 children), and 0 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 0 minors.

By gender, providers in the CoC served 63 (47.4%) women, 65 (48.9%) men, 1 (0.8%) transidentified individuals, and 0 gender non-conforming individuals.

The racial breakdown of those served included: 89 (66.9%) White, 24 (18.0%) Black or African-American, 0 Asian, 0 Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 0 American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 16 (12.0%) Multiple Races. Regardless of race, 11 (8.3%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino in ethnicity.

Of 88 adults or heads of household, 38 (43.2%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 18 (47.4%) reported one previous episode of homelessness within the last three years. 2 (5.3%), 5 (13.2%), and 13 (34.2%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 0 did not report on this data element.



Of the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (24), 10 (41.7%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and their most recent update, while 1 (4.2%) maintained a stable income of greater than zero.




The total number of individuals discharged during the year was 9, which included 3 adults and 6 children. 8 (88.9%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Between admission and discharge, 2 (66.7%) clients over 18 maintained a stable income of greater than zero.

#### **Sub-Populations – All Programs**

18 (20.7%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. <sup>vii</sup> 1 out of every 14.5 adults receiving services this year was a veteran (6.9%). Out of the 6 veterans served, 2 (33.3%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission. At admission, 3 clients (3.4%) of all clients were considered youth (18-24 years of age.)

### Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only



75.6% of adults (62/82) and 17.1% of children (7/41) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (19). When taking severity of condition into account, 51 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.<sup>viii</sup>
