

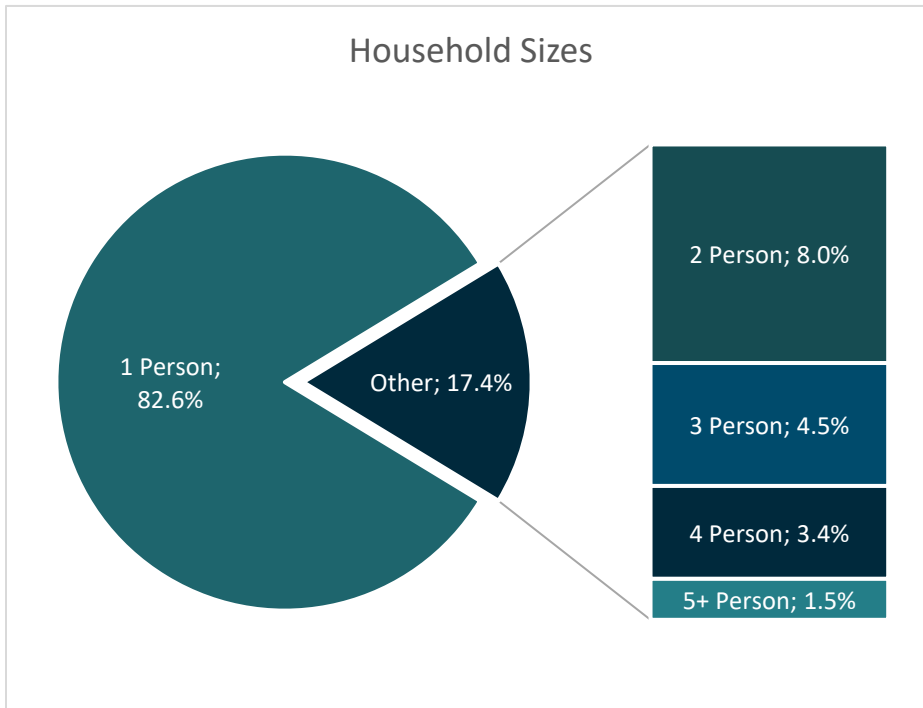
CRHMIS Quarterly Report: 2019 Q4

NY-503 - Albany City & County CoC

Overview – All Programs

Between 7/1/2019 and 9/30/2019, providers in the Albany CoC served 2494 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness.ⁱ Residential programs served 1866 people a total of 2049 times, and supportive services-only programs served 628 people a total of 634 times.^{ii, iii}

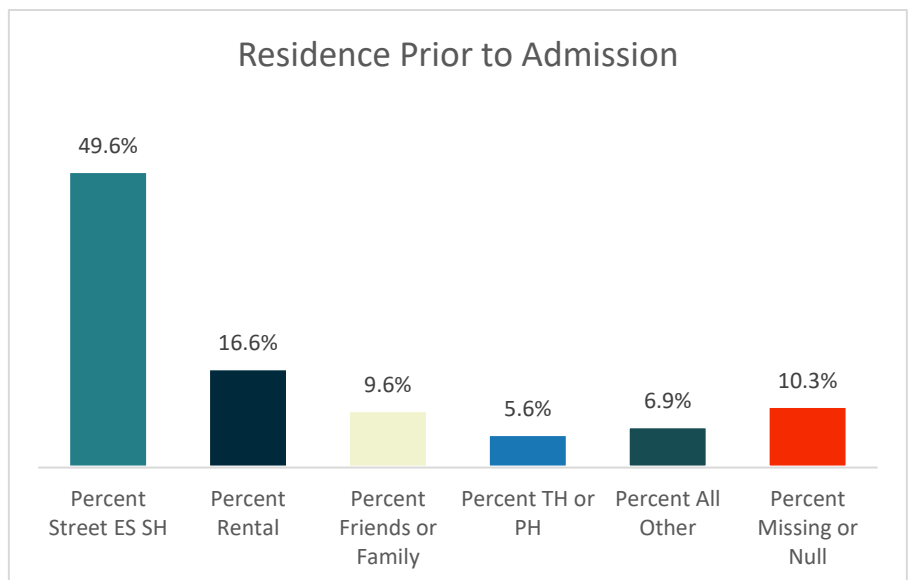


There were 1806 households in the CoC, including: 1487 households without children (containing 1529 individuals), 263 households with both adults and children (containing 322 adults and 486 children), and 56 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 80 minors.^{iv}

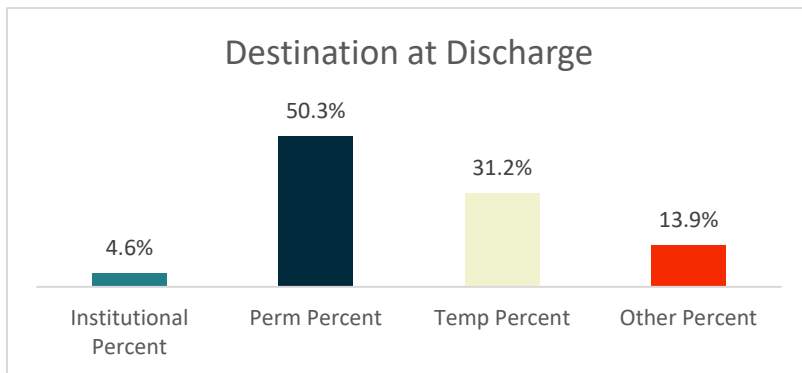
By gender, providers in the CoC served 1042 (41.8%) women, 1349 (54.1%) men, 9 (0.4%) trans-identified individuals, and 2 (0.1%) gender non-conforming individuals.

The racial breakdown of those served included: 827 (33.2%) White, 1357 (54.4%) Black or African-American, 17 (0.7%) Asian, 19 (0.8%) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 27 (1.1%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 106 (4.3%) Multiple Races.^v Regardless of race, 292 (11.7%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino in ethnicity.^{vi}

Of 1879 adults or heads of household, 932 (49.6%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 459 (49.2%) reported one previous episode of homelessness within the last three years. 147 (15.8%), 82 (8.8%), and 211 (22.6%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 33 (3.5%) did not report on this data element.



Of the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (508), 243 (47.8%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and their most recent update, while 87 (17.1%) maintained a stable income of greater than zero.

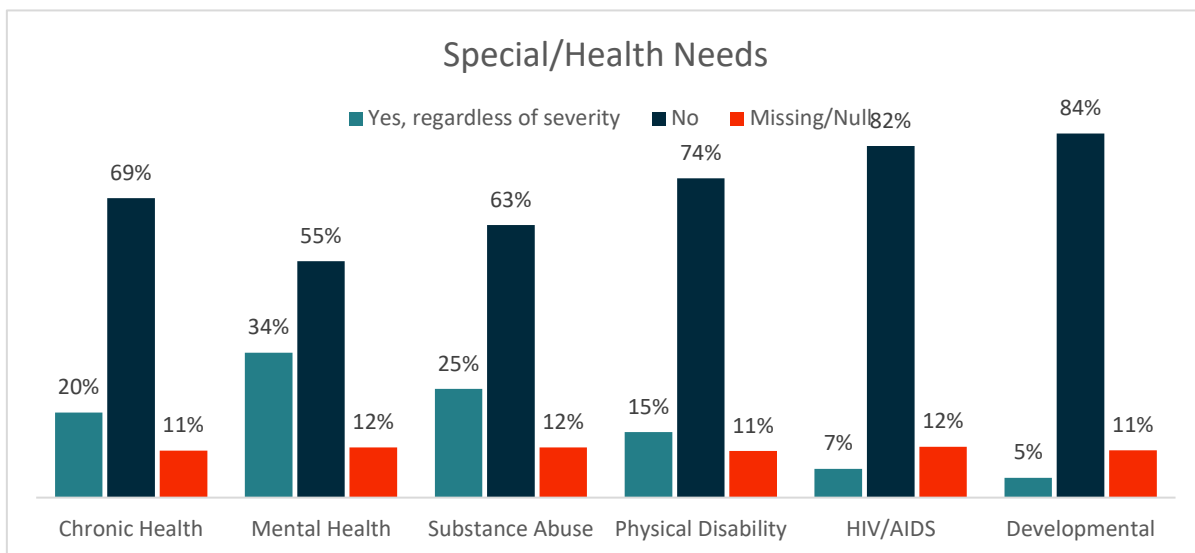


The total number of individuals discharged during the year was 519, which included 368 adults and 151 children. 261 (50.3%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Between admission and discharge, income for 39 (10.6%) clients over 18 rose, while 121 (32.9%) clients over 18 maintained a stable income of greater than zero.

Sub-Populations – All Programs

179 (10.0%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry.^{vii} 1 out of every 5.2 adults receiving services this year was a veteran (19.1%). Out of the 343 veterans served, 287 (83.7%) reported a disabling condition and 28 (8.2%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission. At admission, 162 clients (8.8%) of all clients were considered youth (18-24 years of age.)

Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only



64.5% of adults (974/1511) and 12.7% of children (51/401) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (310). When taking severity of condition into account, 739 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.^{viii}

ⁱⁱⁱ "Persons Served" totals only: if an individual client is served by **BOTH** Residential and Supportive Services within the same report period, the client is counted once in **EACH** total; therefore, adding these together may equal more than the total unduplicated number of persons served. Only new enrollments for the quarter are included for Supportive Services.
