

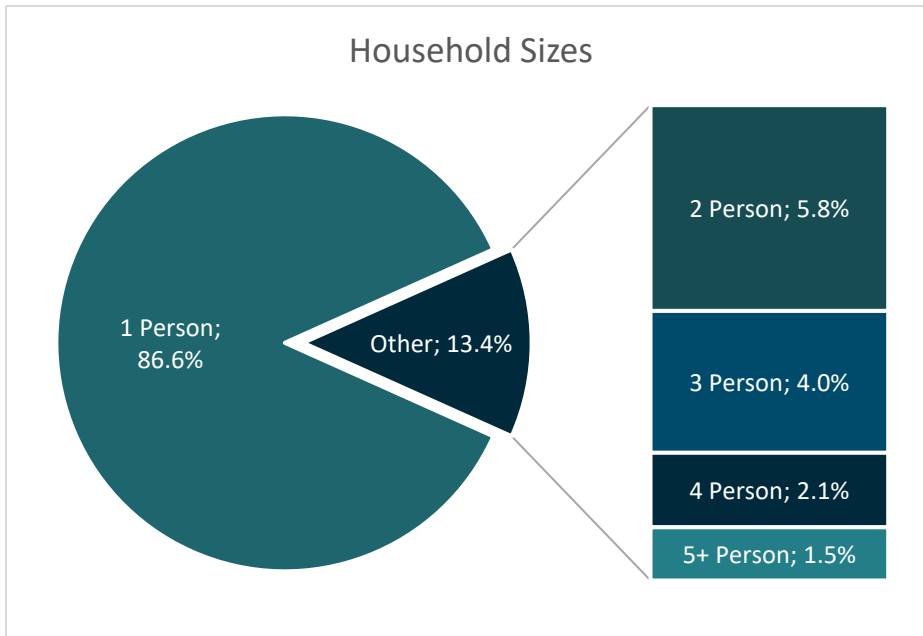
**CRHMIS FY 2019 Report**

**NY-503 - Albany City & County CoC**

**Overview – All Programs**

Between 10/1/2018 and 9/30/2019, providers in the Albany CoC served 5277 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness.<sup>i</sup> Residential programs served 3385 people a total of 5427 times, and supportive services-only programs served 1892 people a total of 1931 times.<sup>ii, iii</sup>

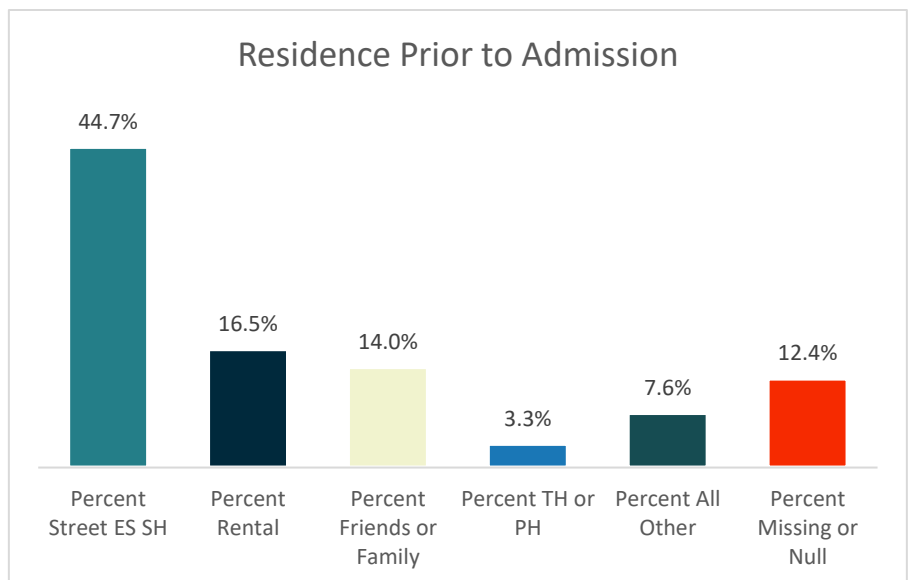


There were 3886 households in the CoC, including: 3243 households without children (containing 3313 individuals), 443 households with both adults and children (containing 545 adults and 858 children), and 200 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 234 minors.<sup>iv</sup>

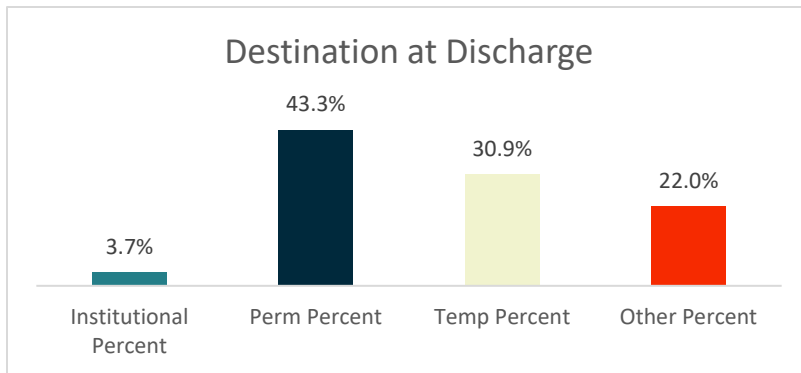
By gender, providers in the CoC served 2082 (39.5%) women, 2772 (52.5%) men, 23 (0.4%) trans-identified individuals, and 3 (0.1%) gender non-conforming individuals.

The racial breakdown of those served included: 1625 (30.8%) White, 2732 (51.8%) Black or African-American, 25 (0.5%) Asian, 33 (0.6%) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 65 (1.2%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 231 (4.4%) Multiple Races.<sup>v</sup> Regardless of race, 644 (12.2%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino in ethnicity.<sup>vi</sup>

Of 3981 adults or heads of household, 1781 (44.7%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 891 (50.0%) reported one previous episode of homelessness within the last three years. 260 (14.6%), 147 (8.3%), and 379 (21.3%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 104 (5.8%) did not report on this data element.



Of the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (589), 271 (46.0%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and their most recent update, while 115 (19.5%) maintained a stable income of greater than zero.

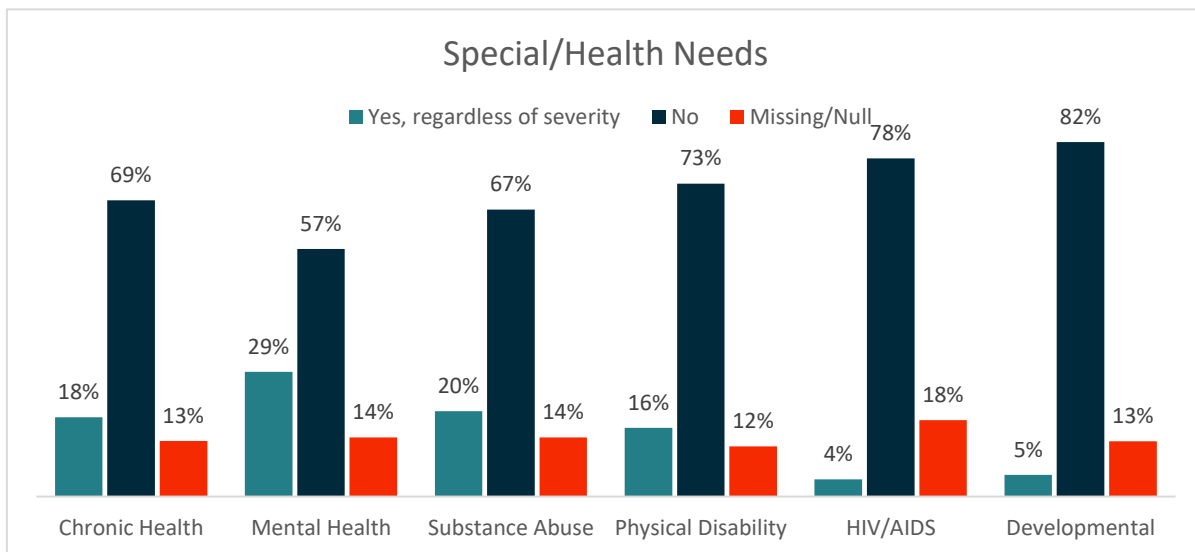


The total number of individuals discharged during the year was 2324, which included 1722 adults and 602 children. 1007 (43.3%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Between admission and discharge, income for 107 (6.2%) clients over 18 rose, while 555 (32.2%) clients over 18 maintained a stable income of greater than zero.

### **Sub-Populations – All Programs**

256 (6.9%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry.<sup>vii</sup> 1 out of every 7.0 adults receiving services this year was a veteran (14.2%). Out of the 526 veterans served, 398 (75.7%) reported a disabling condition and 42 (8.0%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission. At admission, 438 clients (11.4%) of all clients were considered youth (18-24 years of age.)

### **Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only**



55.5% of adults (1837/3311) and 12.9% of children (94/728) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (491). When taking severity of condition into account, 1221 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.<sup>viii</sup>
