


# CRHMIS Quarterly Report: 2019 Q4

7/1/2019 - 9/30/2019

## NY-512 - Troy/Rensselaer County CoC

## <u>Overview – All Programs</u>

Between 7/1/2019 and 9/30/2019, providers in the Rensselaer CoC served 1124 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness.<sup>i</sup> Residential programs served 1020 people a total of 1168 times, and supportive services only programs served 104 people a total of 104 times.<sup>ii, iii</sup>




There were 616 households in the CoC, including: 435 households without children (containing 451 individuals), 172 households with both adults and children (containing 231 adults and 414 children), and 9 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 14 minors.<sup>iv</sup>


By gender, providers in the CoC served 597 (53.1%) women, 506 (45.0%) men, 6 (0.5%) transidentified individuals, and 0 gender non-conforming individuals.

The racial breakdown of those served included: 570 (50.7%) White, 448 (39.9%) Black or African-American, 2 (0.2%) Asian, 10 (0.9%) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 11 (1.0%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 50 (4.4%) Multiple Races. Regardless of race, 152 (13.5%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino in ethnicity.

Of 684 adults or heads of household, 426 (62.3%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 185 (43.4%) reported one previous episode of homelessness within the last three years. 73 (17.1%), 38 (8.9%), and 122 (28.6%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 8 (1.9%) did not report on this data element.



Of the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (219), 121 (55.3%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and their most recent update, while 16 (7.3%) maintained a stable income of greater than zero.




The total number of individuals discharged during the year was 341, which included 221 adults and 120 children. 195 (57.2%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Between admission and discharge, income for 13 (5.9%) clients over 18 rose, while 98 (44.3%) clients over 18 maintained a stable income of greater than zero.

### **Sub-Populations – All Programs**

96 (14.5%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. <sup>vii</sup> 1 out of every 18.4 adults receiving services this year was a veteran (5.4%). Out of the 36 veterans served, 25 (69.4%) reported a disabling condition and 4 (11.1%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission. At admission, 58 clients (8.5%) of all clients were considered youth (18-24 years of age.)

## <u>Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only</u>



71.3% of adults (372/522) and 14.1% of children (59/418) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (150). When taking severity of condition into account, 300 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability. VIII
