

NY-512 - Troy/Rensselaer County CoC

Overview – All Programs

Between 10/1/2018 and 9/30/2019, providers in the Rensselaer CoC served 2023 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness.ⁱ Residential programs served 1664 people a total of 2613 times, and supportive services only programs served 359 people a total of 382 times.^{ii, iii}




There were 1212 households in the CoC, including: 927 households without children (containing 958 individuals), 263 households with both adults and children (containing 345 adults and 600 children), and 22 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 31 minors.^{iv}


By gender, providers in the CoC served 931 (46.0%) women, 991 (49.0%) men and 11 (0.5%) transidentified individuals.

The racial breakdown of those served included: 931 (46.0%) White, 833 (41.2%) Black or African-American, 6 (0.3%) Asian, 20 (1.0%) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 22 (1.1%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 73 (3.6%) Multiple Races. Regardless of race, 285 (14.1%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino in ethnicity. Of 1305 adults or heads of household, 686 (52.6%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 273 (39.8%) reported one previous episode of homelessness within the last three years. 125 (18.2%), 61 (8.9%), and 212 (30.9%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 15 (2.2%) did not report on this data element.



Of the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (239), 134 (56.1%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and their most recent update, while 21 (8.8%) maintained a stable income of greater than zero.




The total number of individuals discharged during the year was 1168, which included 829 adults and 339 children. 656 (56.2%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Between admission and discharge, income for 58 (7.0%) clients over 18 rose, while 302 (36.4%) clients over 18 maintained a stable income of greater than zero.

Sub-Populations – All Programs

152 (12.1%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. ^{vii} 1 out of every 16.8 adults receiving services this year was a veteran (5.9%). Out of the 75 veterans served, 54 (72.0%) reported a disabling condition and 9 (12.0%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission. At admission, 141 clients (10.8%) of all clients were considered youth (18-24 years of age.)

<u>Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only</u>



67.8% of adults (599/883) and 16.7% of children (102/610) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (198). When taking severity of condition into account, 455 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability. VIII

[&]quot;Persons Served" totals only: if an individual client is served by **BOTH** Residential and Supportive Services within the same report period, the client is counted once in **EACH** total; therefore, adding these together may equal more than the total unduplicated number of persons served. Only new enrollments for the quarter are included for Supportive Services.
