



# Overview - All Programs


Between 10/1/2018 and 9/30/2019, providers in the Points North CoC served 2578 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness.<sup>i</sup> Residential programs served 1545 individuals a total of 1814 times, and supportive services-only programs served 1033 individuals a total of 1075 times.<sup>ii, iii</sup>



There were 1454 households in the CoC, including: 1052 households without children (containing 1182 individuals), 387 households with both adults and children (containing 520 adults and 740 children), and 15 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 23 minors. iv


By gender, providers in the CoC served 1258 (48.8%) women, 1203 (46.7%) men and 4 (0.2%) transidentified individuals.

The racial breakdown of those served included: 2115 (82.0%) White, 194 (7.5%) Black or African-American, 1 (0.0%) Asian, 4 (0.2%) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 20 (0.8%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 131 (5.1%) Multiple Races. Regardless of race, 112 (4.3%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino in ethnicity. Hispanic Pacific Regardless of Pacific



Of 1706 adults or heads of household, 445 (26.1%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 283 (63.6%) reported one previous episode of homelessness within the last three years. 98 (22.0%), 23 (5.2%), and 41 (9.2%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame.

Of the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (186), 66 (35.5%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and their most recent update, while 46 (24.7%) maintained a stable income of greater than zero.




The total number of individuals discharged during the year was 1929, which included 1341 adults and 588 children. 1646 (85.3%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Between admission and discharge, income for 51 (3.8%) clients over 18 rose, while 708 (52.8%) clients over 18 maintained a stable income of greater than zero.

# <u>Sub-Populations – All Programs</u>

23 (1.4%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. <sup>vii</sup> 1 out of every 21.1 adults receiving services this year was a veteran (4.7%). Out of the 77 veterans served, 36 (46.8%) reported a disabling condition and 3 (3.9%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission. At admission, 279 clients (16.4%) of all clients were considered youth (18-24 years of age.)

# <u>Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only</u>



65.7% of adults (743/1131) and 15.6% of children (98/630) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (152). When taking severity of condition into account, 525 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability. VIII

Only new enrollments for the quarter are included for Supportive Services.
