

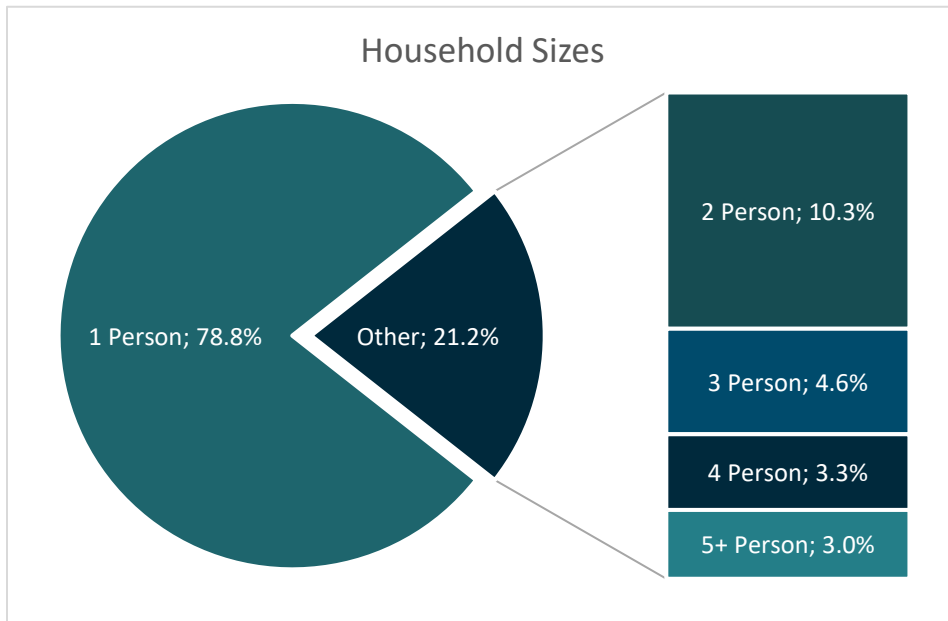
CRHMIS Quarterly Report: 2019 Q4

Overview – All Programs

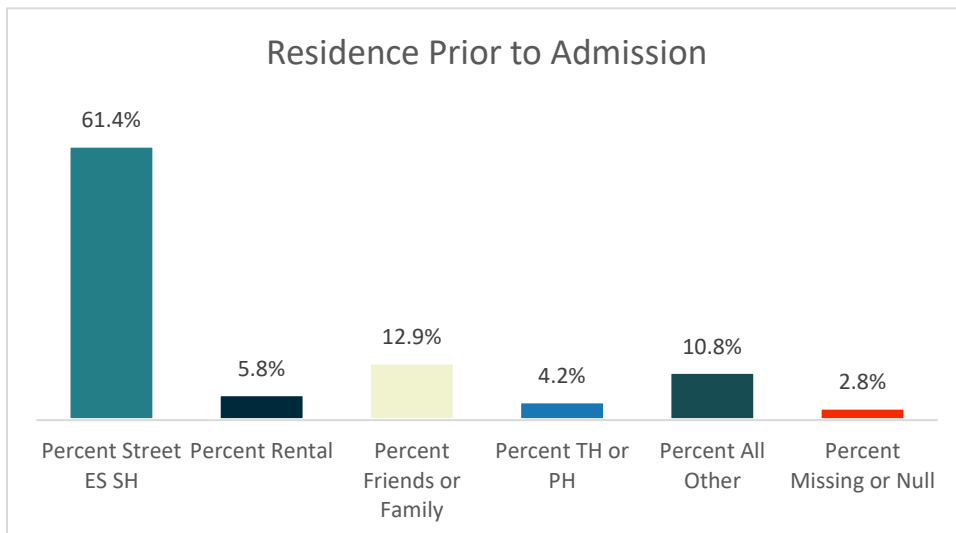
Between 7/1/2019 and 9/30/2019, providers in the Orange CoC served 867 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness.ⁱ Residential programs served 830 individuals a total of 937 times, and supportive services-only programs served 37 individuals a total of 37 times.^{ii, iii}



There were 603 households in the CoC, including: 451 households without children (containing 464 individuals), 116 households with both adults and children (containing 141 adults and 226 children), and 36 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 36 minors.^{iv}

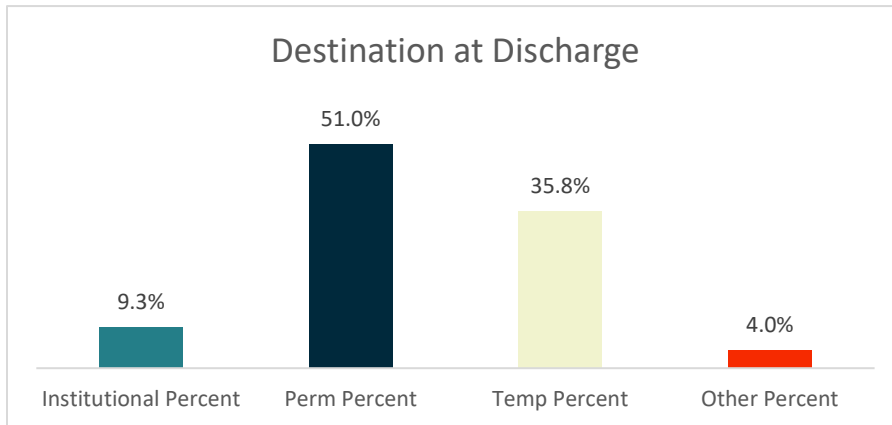
By gender, providers in the CoC served 403 (46.5%) women, 461 (53.2%) men and 2 (0.2%) trans-identified individuals.

The racial breakdown of those served included: 390 (45.0%) White, 401 (46.3%) Black or African-American, 3 (0.3%) Asian, 5 (0.6%) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 12 (1.4%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 51 (5.9%) Multiple Races.^v Regardless of race, 190 (21.9%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino in ethnicity.^{vi}



Of 638 adults or heads of household, 392 (61.4%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 216 (55.1%) reported one previous episode of homelessness within the last three years. 89 (22.7%), 37 (9.4%), and 47 (12.0%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 3 (0.8%) did not report on this data element.

Of the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (144), 68 (47.2%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and their most recent update, while 36 (25.0%) maintained a stable income of greater than zero.

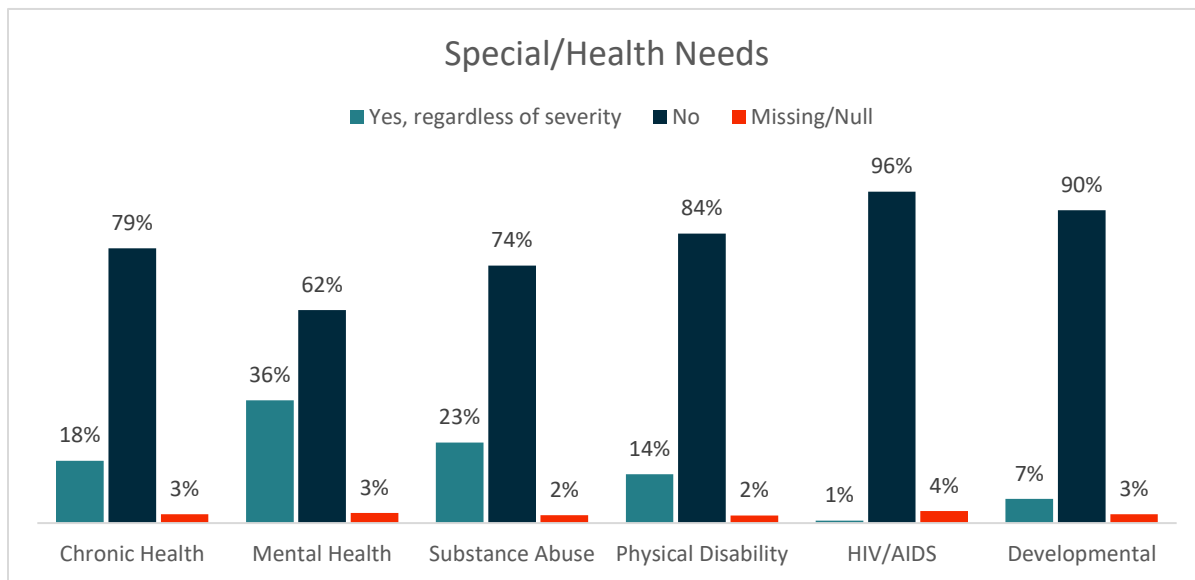


The total number of individuals discharged during the year was 302, which included 193 adults and 109 children. 154 (51.0%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Between admission and discharge, income for 7 (3.6%) clients over 18 rose, while 46 (23.8%) clients over 18 maintained a stable income of greater than zero.

Sub-Populations – All Programs

58 (9.9%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry.^{vii} 1 out of every 13.3 adults receiving services this year was a veteran (7.5%). Out of the 44 veterans served, 41 (93.2%) reported a disabling condition and 8 (18.2%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission. At admission, 52 clients (8.6%) of all clients were considered youth (18-24 years of age.)

Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only



69.0% of adults (336/487) and 23.9% of children (48/201) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (85). When taking severity of condition into account, 264 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability.^{viii}

ⁱⁱ For this report, all Permanent Housing (Housing Only, Housing with Services, Permanent Supportive Housing, and Rapid Re-Housing) and Transitional Housing are residential; Street Outreach, Homelessness Prevention, Day Shelter, and Services Only Program enrollments are Supportive Services.

ⁱⁱⁱ "Persons Served" totals only: if an individual client is served by **BOTH** Residential and Supportive Services within the same report period, the client is counted once in **EACH** total; therefore, adding these together may equal more than the total unduplicated number of persons served. Only new enrollments for the quarter are included for Supportive Services.
