



Overview – All Programs


Between 10/1/2018 and 9/30/2019, providers in the Orange CoC served 2643 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness.ⁱ Residential programs served 1863 individuals a total of 2452 times, and supportive services-only programs served 780 individuals a total of 780 times.^{ii, iii}



There were 2011 households in the CoC, including: 1617 households without children (containing 1643 individuals), 263 households with both adults and children (containing 333 adults and 498 children), and 131 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 144 minors.^{iv}

By gender, providers in the CoC served 1287 (48.7%) women, 1316 (49.8%) men, 4 (0.2%) transidentified individuals, and 1 (0.0%) gender non-conforming individual.


The racial breakdown of those served included: 1227 (46.4%) White, 1109 (42.0%) Black or African-American, 6 (0.2%) Asian, 9 (0.3%) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, 22 (0.8%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 136 (5.1%) Multiple Races. Regardless of race, 665 (25.2%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino in ethnicity.



Of 2093 adults or heads of household, 711 (34.0%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 399 (56.1%) reported one previous episode of homelessness within the last three years. 147 (20.7%), 62 (8.7%), and 76 (10.7%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 27 (3.8%) did not report on this data element.

Of the adults or heads of household

who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (159), 75 (47.2%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and their most recent update, while 40 (25.2%) maintained a stable income of greater than zero.




The total number of individuals discharged during the year was 1381, which included 902 adults and 479 children. 770 (55.8%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Between admission and discharge, income for 30 (3.3%) clients over 18 rose, while 205 (22.7%) clients over 18 maintained a stable income of greater than zero.

<u>Sub-Populations – All Programs</u>

76 (4.0%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. ^{vii} 1 out of every 29.6 adults receiving services this year was a veteran (3.4%). Out of the 65 veterans served, 49 (75.4%) reported a disabling condition and 8 (12.3%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission. At admission, 159 clients (8.0%) of all clients were considered youth (18-24 years of age.)

Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only



35.9% of adults (618/1721) and 20.0% of children (102/509) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (144). When taking severity of condition into account, 392 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability. Viii
