


# CRHMIS Quarterly Report: 2019 Q4

# NY-606 - Rockland County CoC

## Overview - All Programs

Between 7/1/2019 and 9/30/2019, providers in the Rockland CoC served 197 people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness.<sup>i</sup> Residential programs served 197 individuals a total of 230 times, and supportive services-only programs served 0 individuals a total of 0 times.<sup>ii, iii</sup>




There were 126 households in the CoC, including: 96 households without children (containing 101 individuals), 28 households with both adults and children (containing 38 adults and 53 children), and 2 households of only unaccompanied minors (under 18 years of age), containing 5 minors. iv

By gender, providers in the CoC served 85 (43.1%) women and 112 (56.9%) men.


The racial breakdown of those

served included: 81 (41.1%) White, 98 (49.7%) Black or African-American, 1 (0.5%) Asian, 3 (1.5%) American Indian or Alaskan Native, and 6 (3.0%) Multiple Races. Regardless of race, 54 (27.4%) individuals identified as Hispanic/Latino in ethnicity.



Of 139 adults or heads of household, 64 (46.0%) indicated a prior residence of Emergency Shelter, the streets, or Safe Haven. Of these clients, 29 (45.3%) reported one previous episode of homelessness within the last three years. 8 (12.5%), 10 (15.6%), and 14 (21.9%) reported that they had been 2, 3, or 4+ times homeless (respectively) during the same time frame. 3 (4.7%) did not report on this data element.

Of the adults or heads of household who were in program a year or more and received an annual assessment (4), 3 (75.0%) saw an increase in income (cash and cash benefits) between admission and their most recent update, while 1 (25.0%) maintained a stable income of greater than zero.




The total number of individuals discharged during the year was 41, which included 29 adults and 12 children. 32 (78.0%) were discharged to a permanent destination. Between admission and discharge, income for 1 (3.4%) clients over 18 rose, while 15 (51.7%) clients over 18 maintained a stable income of greater than zero.

## <u>Sub-Populations – All Programs</u>

21 (15.7%) individuals over 18 met the criteria for chronic homelessness at the time of project entry. <sup>vii</sup> 1 out of every 7.1 adults receiving services this year was a veteran (14.2%). Out of the 19 veterans served, 14 (73.7%) reported a disabling condition and 2 (10.5%) met the criteria for chronic homelessness at admission. At admission, 16 clients (11.5%) of all clients were considered youth (18-24 years of age.)

# <u>Special Needs – HUD and HHS Funded Programs Only</u>



66.7% of adults (26/39) and 18.5% of children (5/27) in HUD or HHS funded programs self-reported at least one physical, emotional, or other health condition *regardless of whether the condition had become serious enough to be disabling*. Among those reporting multiple conditions, the most significant comorbidity was Mental Health and Substance Use (7). When taking severity of condition into account, 25 adults reported conditions that met the criteria to be considered a disability. VIII

Only new enrollments for the quarter are included for Supportive Services.
